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SALVATION

"THE JUST FOR THE UNJUST"

"For Christ also hath once suffered for sins, the just for the unjust . . . being put to death . . ." (I Pet. 3:18).

These inspired words direct our attention to the great Biblical doctrine of "substitutional suffering" for sins. The one for the other, "the Just for the Unjust." They also imply Judgment, which is the due and orderly process by which, upon due examination, men are divided and classified as "Just" or "Unjust."

Justice requires that the Just be protected against suffering for the wrongs of another and that the Unjust escape not the suffering due his wrongs. "And every transgression and disobedience received a just recompense of reward." (Heb 2.:2.) To administer Justice is the basic function and responsibility of all Government, be it heavenly or human. All authority exercised by rulers is, for the time being, authority delegated to them by Christ, who is "far above all principality, and power, and might, and dominion." (Eph. 1:21.) While Justice under Human Government too often suffers a miscarriage with terrible chaotic results, and especially so in the end days of Human Government, (Matt. 24:12), the messianic government of Christ, the Prince of Peace now, and the King of Righteousness and the King of Peace (Heb. 7:2), in the millennium is thus described: "Of the increase of his Government and Peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon His Kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with Judgment and with Justice from henceforth even for ever." (Isa. 9:7).

If then the throne of God is for ever and ever and a sceptre of right-eousness is the sceptre of His Kingdom. (Heb. 1:8), it is evident that to save "Unjust" men from their sins and the "Just" condemnation of death already upon them, presented an overwhelming judicial problem, that is a problem of **Right** rather than one of **Might**. "Shall not the Judge of all

the earth, (yea, all the universe) Do Right?" (Gen. 18:25). Yes, He did Do Right, for instance, by Sodom: Just Lot was delivered (2 Peter 2:7), and the "Unjust" for an example, "suffered the vengeance of eternal fire." (Jude 7.) There was no "Substitutional suffering" here of the "Just for the Unjust." It was a righteous judgment dealing out Justice.

The same kind of a righteous judgment of a righteous Judge was executed over the former world in the days of Noah. Here too, righteous Noah with his house as a gift to him, was saved and the wicked destroyed from the face of the earth. Neither did here the "Just suffer for the Unjust." The Just one even condemned the world of his day in that he built the ark. (Heb. 11:7.)

These are terrible judgments, but they are absolutely **Just** and based upon the inviolate and inflexible **Law of Sin and Death** (Rom. 8:2) also embodied in the Law of Moses and reflected even in the Laws of Nature, which underlie the material creation, so that: "Whatsoever a man soweth that shall he also reap." (Gal. 6:7.) And God is not mocked if some one would trifle with this law and "do evil, that good may come? whose damnation is **just.**" (Rom. 3:8.)

Moreover, the law of sin and death will never forgive and is never at rest until it is vindicated in bringing the sinner into death. So we must say that a sin once committed is never forgiven, until a just recompense of reward has been suffered for it. If the sinner is forgiven, - as we hear so much about,-it is not because his sins were forgiven, for they were not, -but because they were suffered for by another, a just one, who had no sin, no not a one of his own to suffer for. This requirement of absolute sinlessness on the part of the substitute sufferer eliminated at once every human being as a candidate for a

sacrifice for sins and pointed to perfect Diety as being alone eligible. But perfection is not the only requirement,-countless angels, created perfect, may have qualified on this score but are eliminated because there exists no kinship between Angels and the Human Race; their "natures" are different; nor is there any likeness in the Image they bare. (Heb. 2:16 and Gen. 1:26.) They may "judge" one another, but they cannot "suffer" one for the other. Here, too, Diety, God the Son, alone could qualify as the Sacrifice, and a Sacrifice is an innocent one given up to suffer for another's cause or good.

Nor are perfect sinlessness and kinship the only conditions to be met by the substitute sufferer. The law of sin and death operates without respect of persons, but with inflexible respect to deads: where ever the misdeeds are found, there it strikes surely, inescapeably and unerringly. Even if there was among humans a person, made "just" by his deeds, which there is not, no not one, this law could not allow, much less compel, one intelligent CREATURE to suffer for another such CREATURE, without losing its character of being "holy, and just, and good." (Rom. 7:12.) And without discrediting the Law-Giver and His holiness, and making the law an instrument of injustice, oppression and violence.

Therefore, the substitute sufferer can be none less and none other than the Creator and Law-Giver Himself, acting in a sovereign will and wisdom and such a manner that every right and security of any other creature are kept absolutely inviolate and unprejudiced and that not "one jot or one tittle shall in no wise pass from the law, till all be fulfilled."

Between the Judgment of Adam in Eden and the Great White Throne Judgment, there are others, past and future, which are "righteous judgments of God," as in 2 Thess. 1:6-9. All based on simple Justice and man's works, recorded in "books."

Let us contrast now with these Judgments another very unique, out-

standing and distinct judgment; none like it ever before, none like it ever again! It is the judgment at Calvary and of the world. As it is written: "Now is the judgment of this world." (John 12:31.) Again, as in the days of Noah and Lot, there was but One Just Man, Jesus of Nazareth and a world of sinners,—living, dead and yet unborn,—now to be judged. But lo, and behold, this time the judgment is in reverse:

The just died and the sinners lived. "The just for the unjust."

By JUSTICE He should have lived, but by GRACE He could die. By the grace of God, He tasted death for every man. (Heb. 2:9), He died representing every man, and the believer reckons himself now dead. (2 Cor. 5: 14.) And he that is dead is free from sin (Rom 6:7),—he through the law is dead to the law. He passed beyond its jurisdiction, "is not under the law but under grace. "For the Law of the Spirit of life, in Christ Jesus hath made me free from the law of sin and death." (Rom. 8:2.) It is nailed to the cross. (Col. 2:14.)

Seeing God

There are a number of Scriptures in the Old Testament which speak about various ones seeing God and other passages in the Old and New Testaments say that no man hath seen God at any time, nor can see Him and live, etc. On the surface these statements seem contradictory and they are readily seized upon by unbelievers as proofs that the Bible is imperfect and not inspired of God.

First we shall quote the various passages on the subject and then we shall consider them. Here are some that speak about seeing God: "And Jacob called the name of the place Peniel: for I have seen God face to face" (Gen. 32:30). "Then went up Moses, and Aaron, Nadab, and Abihu, and seventy of the elders of Israel: And they saw the God of Israel . . . they saw God, and did eat and drink" (Ex. 24: 9-11). "And the Lord spake unto Moses face to face, as a man speaketh unto his friend . . . thou shalt see my back parts" (Ex. 33:11, 23). "In the year that King Uzziah died I saw also the Lord sitting upon a throne . . ." (Isa.

The following are passages that say God cannot be seen: "And he (God) said, Thou canst not see my face: for there shall no man see me, and live" (Ex. 33:20). "No man hath seen God at any time; the only begotten Son which is in the bosom of the Father, he hath declared him" (John 1:18). "The King of kings, and Lord of lords; Who only hath immortality, dwelling in the light which no man can approach unto; whom no man hath seen, nor can see" (I Tim. 6:15, 16).

To begin with, we may say that the subject of divine manifestation is one of which man can know but little, and that little is revealed through the imperfect forms of human speech, which often fail to represent clearly spiritual and divine truths. Human language is very meagre and inadequate to express fully and properly things pertaining to God. And in our usage of words each science has its own technical expressions and uses many words in special and peculiar senses, so that the same word may have widely different meanings when used with relation to one science or to another branch of learning. So the Bible, or the so-called science of theology, uses language in senses foreign to other departments of human thought.

We speak of seeing the sun and say that it is beautiful to look upon, whereas in reality no man has ever seen the sun. If one were to draw near and gaze upon the sun in its unveiled

glory, he would vanish into nothingness before its awful power. We see a few faint beams of sunlight struggling through the atmosphere that shrouds our globe, but no man has ever seen the glory of the sun. And yet we speak of seeing the sun and no one contradicts our statement.

In the same way Scripture speaks of some having seen God, while it is also true that no one has nor ever will see God in all His intrinsic glory and in His full splendor of divine majesty. We may see God in various ways; we may see Him in His works, in the wonders of creation and in the mysteries of our own existence; that is, we may behold His power, and witness the manifestations of His wisdom and the workings of His hand, and yet we do not see God Himself; He is still "the invisible God," "whom no man hath seen, nor can see."

Though God is invisible, yet He does manifest Himself in various ways, so that His creatures are conscious of His presence and say they have seen Him. In the Old Testament there were manifestations of the Divine Presence, as in the form of a man to Abraham and in the man that wrestled with Jacob (Gen. 18 and 32), and in the form of the angel of Jehovah to Moses and others (Ex. 3). Thus they saw God, though His divinity was veiled and His glory concealed. In the New Testament we see God manifest in flesh in the Man Christ Jesus and we behold "the light of the knowledge of the glory of \Breve{God} in the face of \Breve{Jesus} Christ" (2 Cor. 4:6).

There is, therefore no difficulty or discrepancy in the various passages in the Bible about seeing God. If we consider them in the light of our own expressions about the sun, we see how logical they are even from this standpoint.

In closing our remarks on this subject we would add the following incident. "Show me your God," said an unbeliever. The believer led him out and bade him look on the sun; but he turned his eyes away and could not gaze upon its glory. "Ah," said the believer, "if thou canst not look upon one of His ministers, how canst thou expect to behold God?" It is only through the Man Christ Jesus, the Son of God and Son of Man that we can draw nigh to God and behold Him.
