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SALVATION

"WOULD GOD I HAD DIED FOR THEE, O ABSALOM, MY SON, MY SON"

(2 Samuel 18:33)

Moved, yea constrained, yea COM-PELLED by a self-effacing, self-forgetting and a self-sacrificing LOVE and a COMPASSION to the depth of which few fathers' hearts were ever pierced, David, the King of Israel cried out the above words in unspeakable agony of soul. Why that? Was not Absalom a most rebellious, proud, murderous, shameless, and merciless son, who surely would not have spared HIS FATHER, would he have fallen into his hands. And David KNEW IT. (II Samuel 15:14.) Did he not have MANY more GOOD sons to live for? Why should he have prayed to DIE for the rebellious son and in his place? To be sure, to return home after "wasting his substance with riotous living," was NO MERIT to make him worthy and give him a place of preference, and by rights and JUSTICE, he belonged on the lowest place of an unprofitable servant, which he realized, and by anything that is FAIR and JUST, the OBEDIENT and SERVING SON, should have enjoyed every preference and pre-eminence in the home. But, alas! LOVE that will not let me go, LOVE so amazing, so divine and so BOUNDLESS, does not recognize unlovely sin-ruined raggedness, nor can it be limited by the undeserving unworthiness of them upon whom it bestows itself, and being PERFECT and INFINITE as GOD IS, it must needs reach out with outstretched arms to embrace the very rebel and deadly enemy.

Love reconciles to itself the irreconcilable, to win him, it forgives and goes ALL THE WAY to make

PEACE with the enemy, at any price, even the price of the "BLOOD OF THE CROSS TO RECONCILE ALL THINGS UNTO HIMSELF" (Col. 1: 20). It is a motive that MUST seek and find expression to be KIND and SHIELD, if need be, the very enemy by a VOLUNTARY SUFFERING in his stead, always in a TH1RST of being loved instead of hated and in a patience of hope of winning the love of the enemy who "hateth without a cause." (John 15:25). Such LOVE displayed and highlighted in the "SUBSTITUTIONAL SUFFERING of the CROSS, against the dark background of the shame, the hate and the rebellion of the Human Race, symbolized by that Cross, - such LOVE I say, is the expression of a GLORY, which only an infinite God can express or possess. Thus we faintly grasp how that the "Son of man," in his "beforehand sufferings" was GLORIFIED and the Father in Him, (John 13:31), (I Peter 1:11) as He was lifted up on the Cross and the agony that preceded it in Gethsemane. To such a GLORIFIED LOVE, the most intense SUFFERING FOR

and in the STEAD of them on whom it bestows itself, is, because of the "manner of that love," NOT suffering at all to the LOVER, but is as the quenching of an intense thirst to his soul.

"Jesus . . . saith" I THIRST! (St. John 19:28). For what? For water? NO, NO and a thousand times NO! NOT in that most solemn moment would He care and bother about a drink of water when He was about to say, "It is finished," and bow his head in death. He did THIRST for your LOVE and for mine. But man gave him VINEGAR and He received it, and said, "IT IS FINISHED."

DO YOU STILL GIVE HIM VINE-GAR INSTEAD OF YOUR LOVE AND AFFECTION?

He cannot and does not COMPEL you to love Him. He wants to WIN it by FIRST having loved YOU with a "LOVE THAT WILL NOT LET ME GO." And He desires that you "KNOW THE LOVE OF CHRIST WHICH PASSETH KNOWLEDGE." (Eph. 3:19)

As Christ went into death by a love which passeth knowledge, and in a THIRST for love unquenched and lacking in response, He arose from among the dead with that THIRST still in his soul. Thus it is significant that He asked Peter three times: "Simon, son of Jonas, LOVEST THOU ME?" (John 21:15-17). Unhappily our English translation does not set forth ALL the precious truth in this text. To the three-fold question, LOVEST THOU ME?" meaning with a deep love, Peter three times answered: "Thou knowest that I like Thee" expressing a less deep love, which had to be and was acceptable to the Lord, who cannot compel, but only inspire his kind of divine and perfect love, and when we will not, or as in Peter's case CANNOT respond with the best, he accepts the next best. Peter COULD NOT at that time in truth say that he loved Christ with the same Godly love, with which Christ loved him; his threefold denial had thoroughly sobered him and stripped him of his self-confidence. He had learned by bitter experience "not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think"

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"THE CHURCH OF THE LIVING GOD"

Meetings of the Assembly and Other Meetings

From 1 Cor. 14 it is evident that the Apostolic Church had what we may call "Open Meetings" for edification, exhortation and comfort. That is, they had meetings which were open for any, under scriptural limitations, to speak unto edification as the Spirit of God led. This is clearly set forth in the following verses: "If any man speak ... let it be by two, or at the most by three ... Let the prophets speak two or three, and let the other judge: If any thing be revealed to another that sitteth by, let the first hold his peace. For ye may all prophesy one by one, that all may learn, and all may be comforted" (vs. 27-31).

Such a meeting is to be limited to two or three speakers, so as not to bring in confusion of thought, and those who take part are exhorted to "Let all things be done unto edifying," and "Let all things be done decently and in order" (vs. 26 and 40). The Open Meeting is an assembly meeting where saints come together as an assembly to wait upon the Lord for ministry, without any prearrangement as to speakers, counting upon Him to edify them by whomsoever He will. If none feel able to give an address to occupy the whole time, several may speak unto edification and profit, as the above scriptures provide for. It is very important that meeting of this character be regularly held for the upbuilding and encouragement of the Assembly.

Those who minister should seek to be faithful and wise stewards and give forth to the Lord's household "their portion of meat in due season." Such the Lord looks for and He says: "Blessed is that servant, whom his lord when he cometh shall find so doing" (Luke 12:42, 43). It is not enough to merely speak correctly according to Scripture or to eloquently present a subject. The Lord would have ministry presented that is "meat in due season," the suitable and timely word for the needs of those gathered. This is what is meant by prophesying, which 1 Cor. 14 stresses as most important and that which we should covet (vs. 39). It means to tell forth the mind of the Lord, or as Peter writes: "If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles (or mouthpiece) of God" (1 Peter 4:11). It is giving living ministry in the power of the Holy Spirit and meeting present needs.

Other meetings defined—There are, however, other meetings besides assembly meetings which should be held among a gathering of Christians. As already pointed out in section D.—"The Divine Way of Ministry," every place your faith to God-ward is spread abroad" (1 Thess. 1:8). The Assembly should be a real base of supply from which the gospel goes forth into a dark world, and from which evangelists and workers launch out into the streets and highways with the glad tidings of salvation, encouraged

by the refreshing fellowship and prayers of those in the Assembly.

As the four Gospels form the firm foundation of the New Testament, and as the reception of the gospel is the foundation of the Christian life, so the preaching of the gospel lies at the foundation of Assembly testimony. Any Assembly that has no heart for the gospel is surely not an Assembly after the divine model in the Scriptures. The Epistle to the Philippians tells us how zealous the Assembly at Philippi was in the gospel. Paul thanked God for their "fellowship in the gospel from the first day" (chp. 1:3, 4), and could say that in the defense and confirmation of the gospel they were all partakers of his grace (1:7).

No individual is in a right condition of soul if he is not seeking in some way to bring souls to Christ, and no Assembly of Christians can be in a right spiritual condition if they are not interested in the salvation of souls and making efforts to bring the gospel of God's grace to them. All believers are not able to preach the gospel, but all can pray for souls to be saved, and for those who proclaim the glad tidings. All can make efforts to bring some one to the Gospel Meetings and all should be able to witness to souls of Christ the Saviour and to give out gospel tracts. It does not matter what a person's gift is, or whether he has any prominent gift at all, he can and ought to cultivate a longing desire for the salvation of souls.

If Assemblies and individuals are satisfied to go on from week to week, month to month and year to year without a single leaf stirring in the gospel and without a single conversion, their state must be certainly very low. On the other hand, where the Assembly is drawn out in earnest prayer for the gospel and for the salvation of souls, there is freshness of spirit and zeal for souls and streams of blessing are bound to follow. Every new convert, truly born again, is a source of new joy and brings new life into the Assembly. Where there is no effort put forth in the gospel and no conversions take place, a deadness and dullness among believers is found and there is bound to be a dying out because there is no going out with the gospel.

As to methods of evangelism, we need to study the Scriptures and meetings are to be held by Christ's gifts to the Church and carried on under their own personal responsibility to the Lord. Such meetings should be entirely in the hands of those who are competent and who assume responsibility for them. These meetings are not to be confused with assembly meetings where all are free to take part as led by the Holy Spirit.

The meetings which Paul held at Ephesus in the synagogue, and in the school of Tryannus would be an example of meetings conducted by individuals (Acts 19:8-10). Under

this heading would come meetings for the preaching of the gospel, Sunday School, or children's meetings, young people's meetings, Bible classes and special meetings for ministry to Christians. With this word as to the distinction between assembly meetings and meetings carried on by individuals, we may now consider

Evangelistic Meetings and Efforts

Under this section we purpose to consider Gospel Meetings and Sunday Schools and Children's Meetings. Such evangelistic work is most important and should form a vital part of the activities of every Assembly. Though not carried on by the Assembly as such, but by individuals called by the Lord for this work, the Assembly should encourage such meetings and support by prayer and material help all such efforts to reach the unsaved and to bring them in to hear the way of salvation that they might be saved.

In taking up evangelistic meetings last in order, we are not classing them as of lesser importance than those meetings previously considered. We have merely spoken first of the meetings carried on by the Assembly itself and now would take up evangelistic meetings as work carried on by individuals, for the gospel is a personal service, primarily to the unsaved, and secondarily to the saved as instructing them in the truth. This work is primarily for those gifted by the Lord as evangelists, and the special sphere of labor is the world, or more outside of the assembly than within it.

However, every Assembly should have a stated Gospel Meeting and Sunday School for the work of evangelization of young and old. We firmly believe that the Scriptures would teach us that every Assembly should be a thoroughly evangelistic Assembly, warm hearted in the gospel and energetic in seeking to reach the unsaved with the word of life. Paul could write to the Thessalonian Assembly: "For from you sounded out the word of the Lord not only in Macedonia and Achaia, but also note the preaching of the apostles and follow them rather than the present day sensational and "high-pressure" evangelism that sometimes seeks to do the Lord's work in the world's way. We need more of God's work and less of man's. Let the preaching be in great earnestness, with the love of Christ constraining souls to be reconciled to God, and the power of the Holy Spirit be counted upon to give the message and cause the unsaved to "repent and believe the gospel." Let us not forget to preach repentance and man's lost and ruined estate and God's full and complete remedy in the gospel of His grace in Christ Jesus.

And for lasting results, may we remember that it is, "Not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord" (Zech. 4:6). Think also of James 5:7: "Behold, the husbandman waiteth for the precious fruit of the earth, and hath long patience for it, until he receive the early and latter rain. Be ye also

and to boast and pretend of something that did not really exist within the heart before him who "knoweth ALL THINGS." He was humble and gave Christ what he had at that time. Christ, then, he did not see yet LOVE and believing he rejoiced with joy unspeakable and full of Glory." (I Peter 1:8).
