preciation of God's creation by King Solomon! Though he lived in a luxurious court, resplendent by human adornment, yet the beauty of God's creation left a tender and heartfelt impression upon his heart.

Our heavenly Father reveals Himself today through His handiwork and through His Spirit. Let us

look about us and see the loveliness of God's creation. Can you not perceive the greatness of our God by the endless creation in plant as well as the animal kingdom? There is endless variety, endless fragrance, endless form,—all made by the Omnipotent. One whom the hosts of heaven adore.

Should we not fall before Him and in very dust adore Him?

How refreshing after the winter is gone to see God's creations coming back to life; the barren trees to bud, the flowers covered by winter's snow to grow and bloom in the warmth of the spring-time. Amid this anxious life often filled with toil, burdened with cares, take time to see God in His handiwork, the loveliest of which are only shadows of the original beauty in Eden.

Not until we ourselves are transformed by faith in Christ, reborn in Spirit, renewed in heart by full surrender to our Lord, can we see and appreciate the boundless goodness of God.

ularly after the example of the thief on the cross. Yet, too little stress is laid upon the importance of actually living a Christ-like life. It definitely is the intention of the Saviour that the application of saving Grace find expression in our daily mode of living. In John 15:5 He says: "I am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without me ve can do nothing." Evidently then the acceptance of Christ as our Saviour, which brings with it repentance for our sins, must be supplemented by fruits or works in order that Christianity may really be our way of life.

One of the first fruits we can bring is to confess Him before the world. "Whosoever therefore shall confess me before men, him will I confess also before my Father which is in Heaven. But whosoever shall deny me before men, him will I also deny before my Father which is in Heaven." Certainly no Christian should be ashamed of confessing Christ, who brought to man the glad tidings of Salvation and who died a substitutionary death, to regain what had been lost through the fall of Adam. Never spake man as this man. His teachings are words of divine wisdom, his Sermon on the Mount is without parallel in loftiness of conception and in practical application in dealing with human needs. Glory in confessing Christ before men.

Secondly, just as there are sins of commission and omission, so also we can bring fruits by the things we do and by the temptations we resist. Every walk of life has its snares and pitfalls. In the truly converted Christian, the Holy Spirit warns of impending danger. Our true Shepherd never allows one of his flock to stray too near the precipice without crying out in warning. Strive to accumulate vessels of Faith that will outweigh and overcome any temptation. Fruits particularly valuable in the sight of God are those of which Christ was a type; things which we do out of love and which entail a certain amount of sacrifice on our part, and for which we do not expect to be paid back in turn. Going out of our way to bring meat to the hungry, drink to the thirsty, harboring the stranger, clothing the naked, visiting the sick and those in prison, because "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

If the Lord Jesus is your Saviour, supreme Guiding Influence, you simply cannot keep the matter hid. He will shine through and be made manifest by the glow of your countenance and by the peacefulness of your mien. Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea may have been secret disciples, but when all others left, they came forward, claimed the body of their Lord and laid him to rest, though all the world might ridicule.

The Apostolic Bible Fund

For thou wast slain, and hast redeemed us to God by thy blood out of every kindred, and tongue, and people, and nation.

True it is we can not now measure the effectiveness of the Word, or the increase from the sowing, but God is able to bless the reading of His Word, that it may not return to Him void. It will either serve as a testimony unto life and salvation, or as a message unto condemnation.

It should be a concern and obligation to all true believers to be helpful in the Lord's work, as our Master commanded in St. Mark 13:10—and the Gospel must first be published among all nations.

There is still a further duty alloted to us by our Lord, as we read in Luke 24:47—That repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. In the Acts of the Apostles we read 1:8—But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem,

and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth. And we read that the Scripture must be fulfilled and blessed are we if we can catch the vision of our duty and responsibility, and be helpful by sharing of the gifts which the Lord has entrusted to us, into His service and for the prime objective of winning souls for His soon coming Kingdom.

We have received letters of deep appreciation and thankfulness from the various organizations who are distributing and printing the Word.

As secretary and treasurer of the Bible Fund, the writer had occasion to visit the American Bible Society of New York City, and was greatly impressed with the work and extent of their labors in getting the Bible or parts of it to the uttermost parts of the earth in difficult languages and dialects. Surely God is able to reward such work and laborers who give themselves unto this God-commanded work.

"And the **Lord** God said, Behold, the Man is become as **one of us**, to **know good** and **evil.**" (Gen. 3:22)

God is infinitely good and knoweth good and evil. The Man, being created in the Image of God and after His Likeness, also was pronounced to be very good and was to become as God in the matter of knowing good and evil, but only in God's own good way and good time. Until that time came, God purposed to keep Adam, his created Son, safe from harm and evil under the protecting cover of Innocency, the state of a child, which is not accountable. To this end He gave Adam this commandment:

"But of the tree of the **knowledge** of **good** and **evil**, thou shalt not eat of it: for in the day that thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die."

But the Man, exercising his Godgiven freedom of Will and Action, chose in his own premature time and in the evil way of disobedience, as a short-cut, to become "As gods, knowing good and evil." But, alas, while he thus indeed became "Wise as God" to know good and evil, he himself became evil in his nature and carnal in his mind. He found himself stripped of the Glory of his former good-and God-Likeness and as a Sinner, he fell under the sentence of Spiritual and physical death and dust. We cannot disobey ourselves into God-Likeness (Godliness), much as God desires that we bear His image, nor can wrong means and ways attain right ends, even if they be God's ends. There is no detour around God's word to further God's ends and our own well-being. Disobedience made men evil, (Matt. 12:34), the world evil, (Gal. 1:4) and the days evil. (Eph. 5:16).

And behold, once it was all "very good." (Gen. 1:31).

With good and evil present, discernable and to be known in our world, but subject to confusion under the power of satanic deception and human willing ignorance, truth appears on the scene as the Standard, and supreme and final Authority to judge and classify every act, and purpose and person. "He (Christ) shall bring forth Judgment unto truth." (Is. 42:3). Truth judges good always to be good and evil always to be evil in character and nature, irrespective of appearance. To confuse good and evil in judgment and belief is the basie crror; to pervert good and evil-that is to ajudge good to be evil-and evil to be good is the basic (Satanic) lie and has its source in the Devil, who "abode not in the truth, because there is no truth in him. When he speaketh a lie, he speaketh of his own: for he is a Liar, and the father of it." (John 8:44).

It is the Devil's business to deceive (Gen. 1:3 to Rev. 20:8); to confuse (Dan. 9:7-8, Acts 19:29-32, Jas. 3:16); to mislead into error (Matt. 24:24 German trans. I John 4:6); to pervert, especially the word of truth, the gospel of our salvation (Eph. 1:13, Gal. 1:7, also 2 Pet. 3:16); to propagate and sugar-coat his Lies, which in the "end days" will be stepped up to the satanic work of lying wonders with all power and signs, and with all deceivableness . . . because they received not the love of the truth . . . God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie: that they all might be damned who believe not the truth . . . " (2 Thess. 2: 9-12, Rev. 13:13-14). In this business of satanic deception men will get more and more involved, unwittingly or willingly, as "the day draws near" and "evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse, deceiving, and being deceived" until the lie and error will have penetrated every activity of men-political, (governmental Rev. 13:1, 2, 7, 10), religious:

"And they worshipped the dragon" (Rev. 13:4, 5, 6, 8, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16),—economical: "And that no man might buy or sell, save he that had the mark ..." (Rev. 13:16).

"The Morning Star" in a recent issue translated a Russian's statement which appeared in a Holland News Paper, under date of December, 1938. and I quote: "We live in a terrible land of complete loneliness. We cannot trust anyone any more. The lie is everywhere. And the worst is this that we all know that we live in the midst of a lie. Those who speak to you lie, and they know it: and we who answer, answer with a lie, and we know it. That is the most depressing experience we can have. And if you think of the fact that a 150 million citizens . . . live the lie, practice the lie, then you begin to realize that this is the most terrible disaster that ever can befall a country. So many are detained in the concentration camps that they cannot be counted any more. Roads that cross the country are built by the hands of the prisoners without any mechanical device. They die like flies, of course, and no one hears of their death for all correspondence is prohibited."

This was before World War II, which again paid for a number of additional freedoms, but delivered millions upon millions of men and women from mercilessly torn-up families, into the cruelest form of Slave Labor, now going on in a number of countries. At this rate the next war could easily mean the destruction of the precious freedoms some men still enjoy here and there and leave our world largely a heap of ashes. Let us earnestly pray for those who are in Authority everywhere, "that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty," under a longsuffering God. It may be later than we think. It was so with Israel and Jerusalem when Christ wept over the doomed city. But it was hid from their eyes.

The **truth** may be believed, spoken, loved, obeyed, lived out, done and walked in. It can be denied and opposed but never **prevailed against.**

"HE LOVED HIS MOTHER"

The following is a sketch full of touching interest, of a little ragged newsboy, who had lost his mother. In the tenderness of his affection for her he was determined that he would raise a stone to her memory.

His mother and he had kept house together, and they had been all to each other, but now she was taken, and the little fellow's loss was irreparable. Getting a stone was no easy task, for his earnings were small; but love is strong. Going to a cutter's yard, and finding that even the cheaper class of stones was far too expensive for him, he at length fixed upon a broken shaft of marble, part of the remains of an accident in the yard, and which the proprietor kindly named at such a low figure that it came within his means. There was much yet to be done, but the brave little chap was equal to it.

The next day he conveyed the stone away on a little four-wheeled cart, and managed to have it put in position. The narrator, curious to know the last of the stone, visited the cemetery one afternoon, and he thus describes what he saw and learned:

" 'Here it is,' said the man in charge, and sure enough, there was our monument, at the head of a newer grave. I knew it at once. Just as it was when it left our yard, I was going to say, until I got a little nearer to it and saw what the little chap had done. I tell you, boys, when I saw it there was something blurred my eyes, so's I couldn't read it first. The little man had tried to keep the lines straight, and evidently thought that capitals would make it look better and bigger, for nearly every letter was a capital. I copied it, and here it is; but you want to see it on the stone to appreciate it.

MY mOTHER
SHEE DIED LAST WEAK
SHEE WAS ALL I HAD. SHEE
SED SHEAD Bee WaITING FuR—
and here, boys, the lettering stopped.
After awhile I went back to the man in charge, and asked him what further he knew of the little fellow who brought the stone.

"'Not much,' he said, 'not much. Didn't you notice a fresh little grave near the one with the stone? Well,

that's where he is. He came here every afternoon for some time, working away at that stone, and one day I missed him, and then for several days. Then the man came out from the church that had buried the mother, and ordered the grave dug by her side. I asked if it was for the little chap. He said it was. The boy had sold all his papers one day, and was hurrying along the street out this way. There was a runaway team just above the crossing, and-well-he was run over, and lived but a day or two. He had in his hand, when he was picked up, an old file, sharpened down to a point, that he did all the lettering with. They said he seemed to be thinking only of that until he died, for he kept saying, 'I didn't get it done; she'll know I meant to finish it, won't she? I'll tell her so, for she'll be waiting for me' and, boys, he died with those words on his lips."

When the men in the cutter's yard heard the story of the boy the next day they clubbed together, got a good stone, inscribed upon it the name of the newsboy (which they succeeded in getting from the superintendent of the Sunday school which the little fellow attended), and underneath it the touching, expressive words: "He loved his mother."

"For we can do nothing against the truth, but for the truth." (2 Cor. 13:8).
