Moses was a meek man, and Christ said "Blessed are the meek: for they shall inherit the earth." We know he was meek, because it is written in Numbers 12:3. "Now the man Moses was very meek, above all the men which were upon the face of the earth"

When God first called Moses to service, Moses refused on the grounds that he lacked the necessary qualifications. God insisted, and Moses obeyed. As meek men are apt to be, Moses was very conscientious. He received many instructions and commandments directly from God and felt that he was duty-bound to transmit these teachings to the people, and to interpret these teachings for the people in particular cases. From morning until evening, he sat and listened to the people's problems and troubles and passed judgment on the basis of the commandments which he had received from the mouth of God (Exodus

18:13.) He was weighted down with the responsibility, and being human he no doubt became very tired and perhaps irritable. Should he continue on this course, he might begin to lack the very love and joy of God which he wished to convey to the people. His father-in-law saw the danger.

In Exodus 18:17,18 we read, "And Moses' father in law said unto him, The thing that thou doest is not good. Thou wilt surely wear away, both thou, and this people that is with thee: for this thing is too heavy for thee, thou art not able to perform it thyself alone."

Moses was meek enough to learn and accept the valuable lesson that responsibility should be shared. He sought out "able men, such as fear God. men of truth, hating covetousness" (Exodus 13:21), and gave them responsibility. Together they served the Lord with less fatigue and more joy.
