Even as this woman was convinced that this was the Christ, so does the Lord convince the upright souls of today that He is indeed the Son of God, that came into this world to seek and to save that which was lost.

He reveals himself to a seeking soul. The Lord said, I will be found of them that seek me. And it is truly so. If an upright soul seeks a refuge of safety, that soul will find that God so loved the world that He sent his only begotten son, that whosoever believes in him shall not perish, but have everlasting life, and this life which is everlasting is not meant for only a few. It is meant for all who will reach out their hand and lay hold upon it.

Oh, our preaching today is the same as in the day of John the Baptist and when Christ began His ministry — Repent, for the kingdom of

God is nigh at hand.

Already one of the prophets testified and said, It is not above in the sky where men cannot ascend, it is not down in the depth where man cannot descend, it is not across the sea where man can not reach it, but it is here present with us, where each and every one can have it and can receive the blessings thereof.

It does not require money or wealth. It requires only an upright

and sincere heart. That is all the Lord asks, Come unto me ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.

If we bring our heart, that is all that He asks. He will purge and cleanse it from sin and unrighteousness. He will set up His throne therein. He will make it the habitation of the Lord.

And what else is there that can comfort us in the trials and the burdens, the storms and tempests of this life, excepting peace of God, which surpasseth all understanding? That peace He offers unto you, dear Friends, even as He said to the disciples—Peace I leave you, my peace I give unto you: not as the world gives, do I give—. He said, "Let not your heart be troubled" and "you believe in God, believe also in me."

That same word holdeth good today, beloved. If there is a soul, weary of sin, and hungry for grace, let him come to the Saviour, and his burden can be lifted; his heart can be cleansed; his spirit renewed and a new creation created in that heart.

The old will pass away, all will be made new, and all such then receive the Spirit and the nature of God himself, because they are then His children. He gives to them His Spirit, who leads them on the way of truth and righteousness.

the Saviour, who has broken the yoke of Satan, and who is able to make those who believe and obey Him truly free. But often this wisdom is not so quickly learned.

The human heart is proud, and is loath to confess itself, thus unable to

free itself. So the struggle goes on. Sometimes the soul has victory and rejoices therein; then again, it suffers defeat, finding itself overcome by the power of sin to do what it would not¹, and goes down into the depths of sorrow, being condemned of its own conscience. "O wretched man

that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death?"²

UNDER THE LAW

Thus, the soul is brought under the law. Ever trying to keep the law of righteousness to be justified thereby, but often failing, it finds no satis-

faction and no peace.

No, this is not the way to attain the newness of life. This is patchwork, mending a rent here, while a greater one appears elsewhere, overcoming one weakness by a concentration of the will, only to find oneself fallen into another and perhaps greater one. This is the error to which Jesus refers when he says, "No man also seweth a piece of new cloth upon an old garment". Christ means by these words to warn us against patchwork, against efforts to mend and improve the old natural life, in order to attain virtue and be justified before God.

The remedy is not to improve our natural life, but to give it up, to lose it ,as Jesus said, "whosoever will lose his life for my sake, the same shall

find it"4.

Paul said strikingly to the Romans, "our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin". Now, we were not physically crucified with Christ, but we are crucified with Christ, when through repentance our sinful nature, the sinful life, is nailed to the cross and perishes.

Thus, the way is paved for the new life, for the new birth, as Christ said to Nicodemus: "Except a man be born again, he cannot see the king-

dom of God''6.

But what is more natural than Nicodemus' question: "How can a man be born when he is old?" Or the question of the prison keeper to Paul and Silas, "what must I do to be saved?"




