

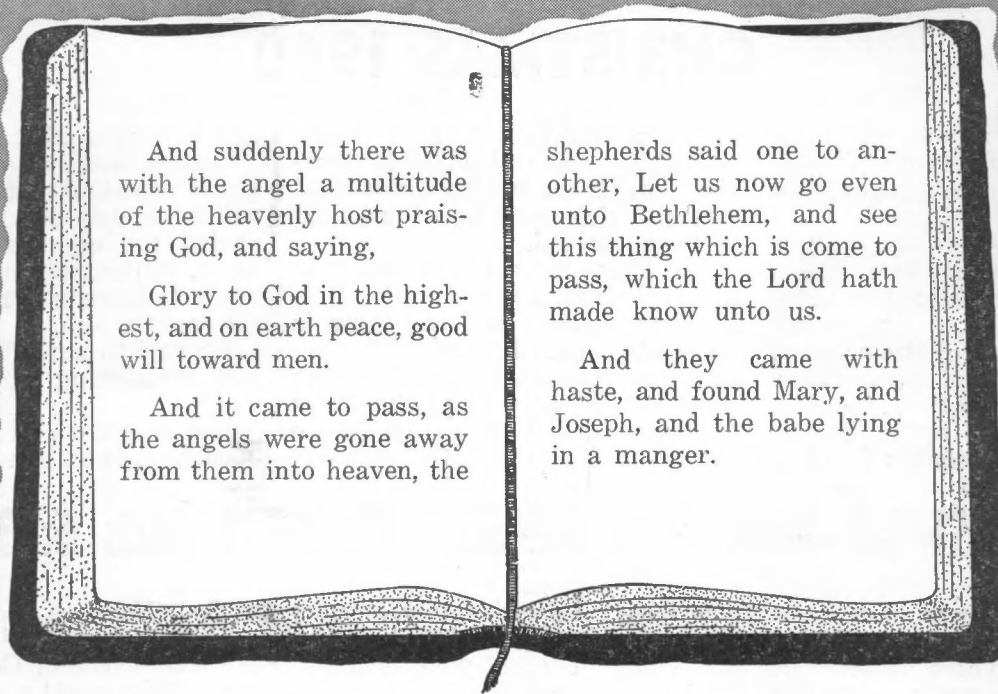
And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying,

DURST NO MAN JOIN HIMSELF TO THEM (Acts 5:13)

In Acts 2:41, it would have seemed that great multitudes would become converted. There was sort of a lull before the storm, after the Lord arose from the dead. Satan had been defeated by the victory of our Lord over death and the grave. Satan no doubt thought that he had once and for all time eliminated the One who stood in his way in keeping mankind in bondage of sin and death.

It required some time for Satan to regroup his forces in the face of this, by him, unforeseen defeat. In this interval of time, Peter addressed the Jewish multitudes as "Ye men of Israel", and convinced them that Jesus Christ was indeed that One whom God had sent to them as Saviour of the world. Being confronted with the fact that He had indeed arisen from the dead, as foretold by David in the Psalms, they were pricked in their heart and asked, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?" The answer was, "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost."

We have every reason to believe that these were people who often followed the Lord, **having been baptized** with John's baptism. It is quite evident that there were others who were baptized with John's baptism, as recorded in Acts 19 1-7. However, this number was much smaller.

The result of Peter's soul-stirring message moved some three thousand to be baptized in one day (Acts 2:41). It has been assumed that such mass conversions should continue in our time. There are those

who use this incident to support present meetings which claim thousands of such who "accept" Christ.

It did not take long for Satan to get into action to frustrate the work of salvation, as appears in Acts 5, regarding the conspiracy of Ananias and his wife, Sapphira. The terrible sin to which they consented together certainly refutes the error that one who has been saved cannot again fall into sin. The Judgment of God upon these people was swift and severe, as they fell over, dead. The result had a sobering effect upon the church: "And great fear fell upon all the church, and upon as many as heard these things."

And then, after this, **DURST NO MAN JOIN HIMSELF TO THEM.** Now the reality of what is expected of God of a redeemed soul became impressively evident, and formulated the basis of discipline in the true church, as referred from time to time by the apostles in their letters. . . . For instance in I Timothy 5:20: "Them that sin rebuke before all, that others also may fear."

The Lord Jesus well knew that when the final battle lines were drawn, there would be few that would **JOIN HIMSELF TO THEM.** Matthew 7:13, 14, "Enter ye in at the strait gate: for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat: Because strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it."

While hate and love are opposites, love and discipline along with chastening are not opposites. Chastisement is a distinct token of the love

of God (Hebrews 12, verses 6-9).

Therefore, it still remains that the true people of God are in the eyes of the world a peculiar people, and no one dares to join himself to them. Let us never regret that we have cast our lot with the Lord and His people.

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THE SILVER LINING

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O HOLY NIGHT

The history of Christ's birth is not new to most of us. We have been taught about it from childhood up . . . But isn't it refreshing to read it over and over again?

How wonderful it is to read the prophecies in the Old Testament. In Isaiah 9:6,7 we read, "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace. Of the increase of his government and peace **there shall be** no end, upon the throne of David, and upon his kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgment and with justice from henceforth even for ever. The zeal of the LORD of hosts will perform this."

Thus did the prophet foretell the coming of the Saviour to the world. He used these good titles. "Prince of Peace", which He is, and has become by being our Saviour, giving us peace after a true repentance. People often don't understand why we don't have peace here on earth. We have peace now in our hearts, if we have repented, but peace in the world will not be until He, Himself, comes here to reign in the millennium.

In John 1:10,11 He tells us, "He was in the world, and the world was made by him, and the world knew him not."

He came unto his own, and his own received him not." All this is already true.

"For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given . . ." We cannot switch this around and say, unto us a child is given, unto us a son is born. Here we are told of the virgin

birth of the Prince of Peace.

In the Gospel of John we are told, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God."

"The same was in the beginning with God" . . . "And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us . . ."

We don't fully understand this, but it is a marvelous way in which God became incarnate. God became flesh in the form of the baby, Christ. He was born of the seed of the woman, entirely free from the man. This was prophesied in Isaiah 7, verse 14. "Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." Immanuel means **God with us**.

We must continually warn against the new revised version of the Bible, which was sponsored by the Federal Council of Churches, who try to change the great truths—including the virgin birth, which they deny. In this new version, they have in Isaiah 7, verse 14 **a young woman shall conceive a son**. This is a fearful change, from **virgin to young woman**. A young woman would be no sign. Multitudes of young women have conceived, but never before did a virgin conceive. Only this way could God become man. The Saviour was born of a virgin. That is how he could be perfect (sinless). He had no human father: Joseph knew not Mary until she had brought forth her first son. Matthew 1:25

The prophecy of Isaiah 7, verse 14 is restated in Matthew 1:20 "... Joseph, thou son of David, fear not to take unto thee Mary thy wife: for that which is conceived in her

is of the Holy Ghost." It is proof that Mary was then a virgin, for she had known no man. He had no sin; He went to the cross for us, and took upon Him all our sins.

No wonder Christmas night was a "Holy Night". That night our Saviour was born. Thus was fulfilled the promise to Eve that her seed (CHRIST) would bruise the serpent's head. It is true that the important time of Christ's life was His crucifixion, but He had to be born into this world . . . So let us rejoice in this Christmas season, because our Saviour was born. What a great gift God gave to us, in His only Son. If we now believe and repent and our sins are washed away, we have eternal life. Oh **HOLY NIGHT WHEN CHRIST WAS BORN**. There were some humble people, like the shepherds who received Him. Strangers, wise men, from the East came; they were led by a star to Jesus. When they found Jesus, they worshipped Him and gave Him three kinds of gifts, gold, frankincense, and myrrh. All these gifts had prophetic meanings. Gold prophecies of kingship, and predicted that Christ would become a King. He will be a king in the millenium, when He will be King over all the world. Incense is what the High Priest offered. This gift of frankincense predicted that Christ would be a High Priest. Now He is at God's right hand, making intercession for us. Myrrh was a material used to embalm the dead. Christ's death was predicted, and came to pass almost 2000 years ago. The prediction of the gift of gold is left to be fulfilled.

The sermon which we heard this Sunday past, Oct. 30, reminded me of one I heard in Union spoken by the late Elder Brother Ernest Graf. Words contained in one of the gospels are, What ye do for one of these little ones, ye do for me.

As far as I can remember a God-fearing woman invited Jesus to visit her, which he accepted but did not tell her what time of the day He would be there. This woman went home to start cleaning. She wanted everything spic and span, as the saying goes, but she was interrupted. Someone came to the house that needed help, but the woman said, "I can not help you; I expect a visitor, and I have to clean the house before He comes." So she kept on cleaning, without helping this person. Sometime later someone else came and asked for help, but she could not spare any time. The time passed, and again someone came that needed help. One of these three was a child. The day came to an end; the house was cleaned, and Jesus came for a visit. The woman told Him I expected you earlier. Then Jesus answered her, I was here three times and you sent me away each time. For us it is a lesson not to close our hand if we have the means to do good.

If we look at the creation of the world, how wonderful God has provided for mankind. Let us take a look at the sun. This world would indeed be a cold and dreary place without the sun. Nothing could grow. I believe it would be impossible for men to live here. And the moon, what is more beautiful than a full moonlight night with the millions of stars which can not be counted? Yet God knows exactly how many there are, as we sang when I went to school, not even one is missing. They all carry out their duties, the sun, the moon and the stars.

We do not find that Jesus walked back with the man again; he could see where he was going. We can believe John, where he writes that if all the miracles should be written what Jesus did, the world could not contain the books. Yet many did not believe.

I had some visitors here from Cissna Park, telling me how much they enjoy my writing and asking me to keep it up. All I can say is what Jesus told the people, Give God the praise. Without His help I can do nothing.

Monday, the 7th . . . tonight we had a group of young members from Roanoke here singing, among them Bro. Ed's sister and her husband. She came to see how I was getting along. It seems to me you are still concerned about me; thank you, Bro. Ed. The singing was wonderful; no wonder David writes in many of his Psalms, Sing praises unto the Lord. The hymns last night we sang to the honor and praise of our Heavenly Father. David played with a harp with 10 strings. I believe he had more than one. We have no more harps, but we have organs in our hearts, and when we sing they sound better than any musical instrument in this world.

Last night we had singing for young and old. It is a large room furnished with a few sofas and a number of easy chairs, a pulpit with a Bible and an organ, which was played by Sis. Anliker, one of the minister's daughters. It was a wonderful hour. After the singing, one of the brothers read a Psalm, and another brother closed with a prayer. After that, soft drinks and coffee were served, with homemade cookies and cake baked right here in our kitchen by Sis. Helen Belsley and her daughter, Sis. Betsy. Everybody had a wonderful time. I might also mention that the floor in this large room is covered with a heavy, dark green carpet.

Sunday, the 13th. Yesterday was a beautiful day, both for body and soul. For the first time since I go to church, I seen a minister lifting up the Bible from the pulpit, telling the congregation only if you believe this book you will inherit eternal life.

In this house, the railings on both sides of the hall throughout the whole building remind me of the

word of God on one side and the prayers on the other. They are solid and strong. As long as we hold on to them we are on the safe side. Nothing will happen to us, but if we let go and depend on our own strength, then we are in danger. The floor looks slippery, and in a moment we could get hurt very bad. So it is with our life. If we do not keep watching and praying, Satan would be only too glad if he could make us fall in this sinful world, so we could not get up any more . . . but if we hold fast to the word of God and to prayer, the Lord will lead us to a blessed ending.

Our Pioneer Family

In 1847, Michael Streitmatter, his wife, Catherine, and children, Frederick, George, Jacob, Christian, Barbara, Catherine, Louis and William, came from Hegelberg, Baden, Germany to Eden, near Hamburg, New York. Work being scarce and wages low, their eldest son, Fred, came west in 1849 in search of work. He worked for a farmer near Princeville. Some time later he sent for

the rest of the family, who arrived about 1852.

In 1854 Michael Streitmatter bought eighty acres of land and built a house for his family. His wife was in failing health and died the first winter. She was buried in their garden.

Christian worked in Peoria, about twenty-five miles from his father's farm, and heard of a new religion which had been spread in Switzerland by Samuel Froelich, being brought to America by journeymen tradesmen who were believers. He was converted and baptized in Peoria, and then told his brothers of the principles and beliefs that appealed to him of his new-found faith. Several of them accepted the same faith and became ardent believers.

All the Streitmatters married but Barbara, who died shortly after arriving in Illinois. All had large families. The number of believers increased, so about 1870 the believers organized the Apostolic Christian Church of Akron Township, or "Streitmatter Prairie" as it was referred to for a number of years. Christian Streitmatter was their first minister. They met in homes until 1880, when the first house of worship was erected in the country—five miles NE of Princeville.

The son of Louis Streitmatter, Samuel, who was born June 10, 1874, attended services as a boy, observed the believers and saw the church grow. On January 7, 1895 he was married to Caroline Rumbold, a native of Wuerttemberg, Germany. They lived on a farm not far from the church for many years. (When they retired they lived in a home on the edge of Princeville.)

They attended the house of worship, and hearing the need of repentance preached by his Uncle Christian, their hearts were touched. In 1906 they were converted, and baptized in the Prairie church. Bro. Sam was a faithful believer, was concerned for the welfare of the church and took an active interest. In 1916 he was appointed treasurer of the church, serving that post for twenty-five years. In 1920, when it was decided there was a need for a new house of worship, Bro. Sam was instrumental in having a new church built in Princeville. He was chairman of the board of trustees, Bros. Jacob Streitmatter & William Stahl serving with him. Many prayers were uttered for guidance, and many sacrifices were made to

realize a new structure. No doubt the children were also denied a few things, yet are thankful today for the house of worship they attend.

Eleven children were born to Bro. Sam and Sis. Caroline. It wasn't easy in those days to provide for a large family, yet the Lord in whom they placed their trust always provided. They taught their children of the way of salvation by living a God-fearing life, and several have followed their parent's instructions. Julia Miller, Lydia Seidel, Bessie Martin, Leila Elsasser and Ben are all believers and attend church at Princeville. Roy; Paul; Emanuel; Lavina Sloan also live in this vicinity, while another daughter, Ida Koehler lives at Prophetstown, Illinois. Samuel Jr. passed away about a year and a half ago. A number of grandchildren, nieces and nephews are also faithful in attending our church.

We can be thankful we had faithful brothers and sisters who were pillars and have kept alive the true faith. We trust their many sincere prayers are heard and will still be answered. Bro. Sam passed on December 27, 1946, and his wife, Sis. Carrie on Oct. 24, 1949. Both are resting in the Streitmatter Cemetery, near the site of the first church. We are sorry to lose such faithful pioneers, but have memories that will not die, and are thankful they will receive their just reward. It is our prayer and hope that we can all be assets to the present church, as our pioneers were. May we all become more firm and faithful in our belief, so that our faith can continue to grow.

"A ONCE IN A LIFETIME TRIP"

Concluded

Charles, our son, surprised us by meeting us at Zurich; to put it mildly we were happy as well, both to see him again after a considerable absence and to have him guide us in this strange land, among people of a different language. We were soon through customs and then on our way by train to Innsbruck, Austria to meet Charles's wife, Ingrid, and their 13-month-old son, Michael, whom we had never seen. We spent two very wonderful weeks in and out of their home, seeing the beautiful mountains. We climbed them, walked them and rode the cable cars. We stayed for 2 or 3 days in a remote Alpine Chalet, beside a beautiful snow water creek, which also furnished power by turbine for our electric lights in the Chalet. Mom and I went climbing up the mountains to the snow lines—saw the beautiful Alpine roses. Three kinds of Alpine flowers are so well known that they are embroidered in many of the doilies, handkerchiefs and tablecloths at Switzerland's embroidery center. A few people lose their lives every year trying to pick the highly prized Edelweiss flower, which grows only high on the peaks.

Innsbruck is situated in the Inn River Valley in the Tyrolean Alps, and is one of the beauty spots of Europe. It is 20 or 30 miles from the Brenner Pass, so well known in history and the wars between nations. On the South or Italian side of the pass, the weather is considerably more mild. You wouldn't have to travel much farther south to find citrus and palm trees, we were told. A week after we were at Brenner, there was a snowfall there which backed up the autos for 20 miles to the new Europa bridge, highest in Europe, on Europe's north-south highway, which is within sight of Innsbruckers.

Most European homes are 2 or more stories high and built of masonry. Two or more families live in nearly all of them. Much fruit, vegetables and also beautiful

flowers are grown in the yards. We also saw the interesting historical sights of Innsbruck and traveled by train to Vienna thru Salzburg, Linz etc. Much of Eastern Austria is agricultural. The fields of wheat, barley and oats were beginning to ripen and were real pretty, which reminds us of the promise, that seed-time and harvest shall not fail so long as the earth shall stand. European farming operations are becoming more mechanized.

We looked forward with a great deal of longing to meet with Bro. Schrock and Bro. Bahler and our dear soldier brethren and friends at the church at Neuhutten. This meeting leaves a memory precious to our hearts. To see the happiness on these young men's faces for this privilege, made possible by many willing hearts and hands, was something we who saw and experienced can never forget. "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least . . . ye have done it unto me." What a blessing to again hear the precious word of life, as it was brought to these dear young men and (to us all) so far from their loved ones and from their home congregations by the brothers, who became willing to spend and to be spent out of love for the Lord to feed His lambs and sheep. Most of us lingered as long as we could in the environment of this fellowship. The time came to part, as it must, our separate ways.

The church people of the Neuhutten congregation were very hospitable, taking the soldier boys and us all into their homes as if they had known us for a long time, sharing the use of their church for our services in our own language, inviting us to stay for their services in the German language, and also inviting us to a hymn singing on Sunday evening, which we enjoyed very much.

We were taken through the Old Folk's Home at Neuhutten, which has a heart-touching background. The European churches would not have been able to build this home (it was frankly stated) without the help of the American churches. They were very thankful and deeply appreciative. Its facilities have been fully utilized since it was built just after the last World war. Some 33 (more or less) widows are staying there. Many of our older members will remember the correspondence from Europe, which told of the pitiful conditions, hunger, cold and sickness after the war, also large

numbers of displaced people who had to flee from their homes and somehow had to be cared for. How comforting now to realize that our little mite reached this destination and was put to good use. "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

Hans Heer, one of the ministers at Neuhutten church, took Charles, Ingrid, Mikie, Mom and I to Oerlingen to catch the train to Heidelberg, where we wanted to look up some of Tillie's cousins. We were real fortunate in this and enjoyed our stay and getting acquainted with them. The memory jewel of this portion of our trip was finding the home where Grandma Metzger (my wife's mother) was born and grew to young womanhood. How it stirred our hearts to see the home where she was a girl—had walked these very streets—went in and out of that very home and left for a strange new land with faith that God would bless them there, which we who knew her can testify. She died in the faith and left a good testimony of faithfulness, humility and love for all.

In Switzerland we visited for five days, experiencing again the hospitality of church people. As you see the beauty of this land you can not help thinking of the beautiful words of the Psalmist, "The heavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament sheweth his handiwork." Here we saw the old "Gibble Church, where my mother first went to church. It is still standing, but is now used as a dwelling. As I looked at it and the picture formed in my mind of my own dear mother going to church here as a child, of first hearing the "truth" which later made her free, it brought tears to my eyes. She repented just after she came across the ocean—she promised God if He would bring her safely through the stormy seas, she would become His child and follower. This she did by the grace of God, and left for us, her children, both a good example, many teachings, a blessed memory and the comfort that she is at rest in those beautiful mansions.

This experience, with some variations, we made again as we visited Eastern Switzerland, where my father was born and raised. It does stir one's heart to see the land where parents and grandparents came from, and we can only conclude with the thought, "Touching the Almighty, we cannot find him out; he is excellent in power, and in

judgment . . . Men do therefore fear Him . . ."

HISTORY OF THE LACROSSE CHURCH

The Apostolic Christian Church of LaCrosse made its beginning with a small group of brothers and sisters, mostly from Illinois, mov-

ing to this area. This part of Indiana had not been established and populated nearly as long as the areas in Illinois, where these brothers and sisters had lived. This area, being as new as it was, offered many opportunities in agriculture. The older, established Apostolic Christian churches were also being blessed spiritually and were growing in numbers. God had at various times provided opportunities in different parts of the world which were sought out and somehow found, by His children, that they might be witnesses of His true word throughout the world.

The Bro. Joe Swing family of Fairbury was the first family of this faith to move to the LaCrosse area. They established their home on a farm east of LaCrosse in the year 1914. The families of George Yergler and Ed Troxel settled in the community of LaCrosse in the year 1915. Edward Wittmer and his sisters, Emma and Anna also moved to this community the same year. The families of Andrew Heiniger, Sam Heinold, Joe Heinold and Harvey Adams established homes in the vicinity of Kouts, also in the year 1915.

There was no church of the Apostolic Christian faith in the area at this time, so these brothers and sisters in faith attended worship services at the Francesville church whenever possible.

The following year, in 1916, the families of Chris Siebenthal, David Siebenthal Jr., Henry Meiss, Sam Frank and Henry Swing moved into the community. Otto Fritz and John Meiss also came the same year.

It was then decided by this small body of twenty-one members to erect a church building at the south end of LaCrosse. It was further agreed that this building was to be erected in the form of a home, trusting that, when the Lord added His blessing with enough members, that a larger church building would be erected. Until this first building was completed, they assembled in the various homes for worship services.

On June 2, 1916 Willis Troxel, six-year-old son of Bro. Ed and Sis. Marie Troxel, passed away. Funeral services were conducted at their home, and burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery.

In June 1916 the building for worship services was completed, and the first services were held June

18, with Bro. Ed Eglin of Morris officiating.

The next service was held July 2, with Bro. Dan Gerber of Bluffton officiating. It was then decided to gather every Sunday, with assurance of the Bluffton and Francesville brethren to provide this little flock with a minister one Sunday a month from each church, leaving two Sundays a month waiting upon the blessing of the Lord, either to send a visiting minister or just gather to sing spiritual hymns, read scripture and have a prayer. This continued until September, 1918, when Bro. George Yergler was instated into the ministry.

In the fall of 1916, the family of John Nuest moved to the vicinity. The families of Rudolph Germann and George Moser arrived in 1917. The Louis Zimmerman and Will Troxel families came in 1918. In 1919 the families of David Sieben-thal Sr., Carl Hotter and Carl Weiss moved here. In 1918, Otto Fritz was baptized, the first convert to be added to this little congregation.

In 1920 the families of Albert Bucher, Eli Stoller, Ludwig Heller, Sam Wuthrich, Adam Pfledderer, Fred Heinold, Jake Heiniger, Henry Heiniger, Emil Marti, and Dave Alt moved into the vicinity. The Weiser Brothers, Harry Bucher, Joe Klopfenstein and Sam Heiniger also came that year. In the spring of 1920, Leah Meiss, the widow of Fred Meiss, moved to LaCrosse with her family. On November 7, 1920, Otto Fritz and Pauline Heinold were united in holy matrimony. This was the first marriage ceremony in this church.

In 1921, the families of Chris Heiniger and John Heinold came to this community, and the families, Matt Heinold, John Alt, Ezra Meiss came in 1922. In 1924 Bro. Harry Bucher was instated into the ministry.

These brothers and sisters which are yet living well remember the bond of Christian love which prevailed and tied this small church so close together. Although the Lord always blessed them with sufficient food and raiment, there was no flourishing era of prosperity at that time, which made the spiritual blessings so much more precious. This we believe is in accordance with the last instructions of our Lord to His apostles, when He said, "These things I command you, that ye love one another."

In the year of 1933 the Lord add-

ed one of the greatest blessings to the church, when twenty-nine souls repented and were baptized.

Bro. George Yergler was ordained elder in 1936. By 1938, twenty-two years after the first church building had been erected, the blessing of the Lord which the church had hoped and prayed for became a reality. The building was too small. The congregation of Cissna Park had a church building which was no longer in use. It was dismantled, moved to LaCrosse and rebuilt. Dedication services were held September 11, 1938, with Bro. Herman Hueni of Bremen officiating.

On January 10, 1948, Bro. Arthur Gudeman was instated into the ministry.

In 1962 a group of members living in the Valparaiso area decided to establish a church in that area. A building was purchased, and they had their first service June 10, with Bro. Harry Bucher being their minister.

On April 7, 1963, Bro. Merle Bucher and Bro. Edward Frank were instated into the ministry (at LaCrosse).

Due to inadequate facilities within the church, and the present building not having the potential for extensive improvements, in 1963 the church had a final decision to build a new church building. The Kritch property in the southwest part of town was purchased. The new building was started in the summer of 1965. On October 16, 1966 the new church building was occupied for the first time for worship services. Open House was held, and dedication of the church was Sunday, November 13.

"Wisemen and Shepherds"

. . . there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field . . . (Luke 2:8) . . . behold, there came wise men from the east to Jerusalem, (Matthew 2:1)

The Shepherds

were **common people**— they came to Bethlehem seeking the Saviour, after receiving the message from the angels. At the opposite end of the intellectual and social ladder were Wise Men—scientists, educated, rich and cultured. They came to the royal city of Jerusalem seeking a King. The Shepherds found the Saviour as a baby in a stable and had nothing to bring **except** worship and praise. The Wise Men, however, found not an infant, but a child. They found Him not in a stable, but in a house. They brought Him their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

We can learn a lesson from the announcements of the two events. The angels announced a Saviour, but the star announced a King. These suggest the two comings of Christ. He first came as a Saviour, poor and with no room for Him at the inn. He soon felt the scorn of men and was ultimately rejected by His own people He came to redeem. Only a few recognized Him and received Him as the Son of God. Matthew's record, however, proclaims the good news of His coming as King of Kings—to receive the royal welcome and reception of His loyal subjects when "every knee shall bow". The first coming of Christ as Saviour is incomplete without His second triumphant coming in glory. Only as we own Him as Saviour now will we be ready to meet Him as King at His coming, again.

Apostolic Pioneers

The faith of this departed pioneer of our precious faith was surely grounded firmly on the solid rock, as was revealed by several of her daughters in a recent visit with them.

She was one who had a great belief in her church, willingly served as best she could, and accepted the teachings and church order as had been given to her, even in her youth.

her Sunday evenings reading her Bible".

She was one to face each new day with faith, courage and prayer, had a great respect for the faith, and guarded it whole-heartedly.

Her father was an elder in Europe, and this was also bestowed upon him when he came to this country with his family, soon after two of the older children had come. No doubt being raised by "born again" parents who had a great respect for the church brought this dear one to realize her need for seeking her Lord at a very early age.

Her children could witness that she had no continuing city here, for she had the hope of a better home after this life and "looked forward" to that time. This vision or hope gave her the necessary faith and courage to continue on life's pilgrimage until she was called from this life.

From a letter written by Elder Johann Schlipf, Dauernberg, Germany, December 3, 1884, to the congregation of Elgin, Illinois

In our Lord Jesus, my beloved brethren in Elgin, Illinois, USA, who with us have received the grace of life in Christ Jesus. God grant to you much grace, mercy, and peace through the knowledge of Jesus Christ, our Lord, that you may

not be in want of any good gift, but rather have life, and that more abundantly, so that your lips may overflow with praise to God.

Beloved brothers and sisters, as I have written a letter to my sister, I cannot forbear to also write to you. You are all in my heart, and day and night I walk in the spirit among you, only you cannot see me. I inquire about you, how you are getting along, and admonish you as it is needful.

Just in this past night, when I had sleepless hours, I was in the spirit in Elbing with the loved ones there, in Hungary, in Switzerland, in Alsace, in Baden, in Luzern, and in America, to and fro among the brothers and sisters. I had to say to myself during the night, Had I but wings, I would fly over mountains and valleys, so fervent was my feeling of love for the dear ones whom we know, and especially for those who departed from us according to the body, in which you are also included. My wish for all of you is that you live in love, peace and unity, to the honor of the name of Jesus Christ, for we all bear His name.

When I think of you, I pray heartily to God.

I embrace, O Lord, Thy servants,
Joined to them in love so fervent,
Asking, Lord, that from Thy face
They receive a thousand blessings;
In thy ways Thy strength
possessing
Lead them in Thy light and grace."

We are so poor and needy from our own self to serve our God, according to His good will and pleasure, and to keep His commandments. But with His grace and power, we can in obedience of His good will walk according to His pleasure, and bring joy to our Father's heart.

He loves us dearly, as the apostle writes, Behold what manner of love has the Father bestowed upon us that we should be called the children of God. Oh what a treasure it is to be a child of God, redeemed and delivered from the wrath which will soon come over all the ungodly and their works. But unto you who fear God shall shine the Sun of Righteousness and Salvation, under the shadow of His wings. Ye shall go in and out and increase like the calves of the stall. What precious promises do the children of God have, those who are true in love and faith until the end.

The true Shepherd, Jesus Christ, give unto you shepherds to pasture you in all teachings and wisdom, that you may live, that you grow and increase in all knowledge of good and obedience of the truth. I also feel as did John when he wrote, "I have no greater joy than when I hear that my children walk in truth." But contrariwise, where they do not walk in the truth, it causes much grief to our Lord, and to His servants. . . .

I beseech you, my beloved ones, be diligent to keep the unity of the spirit through the bond of peace, that you may obtain peace. For blessed are the peacemakers, they shall be called the children of God. Love one another as we have received the commandment from our dear Lord. The author says, Make my love real, pure and true, that it may not be deceitful.

Hold fast onto humility, for God resists all who are proud, but to the humble He gives His grace. Beware that you do not fashion yourselves like the world, but prove what is pleasing unto the Lord, as the apostle writes, Do not walk any more like the others do in the vanity of their minds. . . . Vanity let neither in thy heart nor . . . words reign or live. For through vanity many have **been** led astray by the tempter and have become a spoil of Satan.

Therefore, warn one another, and admonish one another, as it is needful for your own protection and safekeeping in the fellowship of the Holy Spirit and brotherly love, which is the band of protection.

My hearty greeting to you all. Remember us in your prayers, that we, with you, may be kept to eternal life and remain by the grace of God. The brother who loves you in the Lord. Johann Schlipf.
