The rich young ruler didn't kill, steal, or commit adultery. Instead of commending him for his moral conduct, Jesus told him that if he wanted to be perfect, he must sell all that he possessed and give to the poor.

In the sequel to the parable about the prodigal son, Jesus told about the elder brother who resented the reception given to the prodigal when he returned home. Although the elder bro. is the villain, he personifies the virtues we praise. He was the energetic, dependable, moral, and financially responsible person.

A pharisee and a publican, both went up to the temple to pray. The Pharisee with great decorum thanked God for his moral achievements. He was not like some men, extortioners, unjust, adulterers, or even as the publican. He fasted twice a week and gave a tithe of all that he possessed. The tax collector, on the other hand, smited on his breast and prayed aloud, "God be merciful to me a sinner."

To Jesus, the important thing is not where a person stands on the moral scale . . .

He may be at the bottom of the ladder, but if he cries out as did the publican, there is only one direction in which he can go and that is up.

The nearer a person gets to the top, the greater is his temptation to self-consciously consider himself good enough to permit him to relax a bit. While he, like the hare, takes a nap, the tortoise lumbers by and crosses the finish line. Many a highly endowed man has been surpassed by an inferior person who plods on. Fortunately, there are some men like the Apostle Paul who are never satisfied with their position or achivements, but struggle on with a unity of purpose toward the upward call of God in Christ Jesus.

The Master blessed those who hunger and thirst after righteousness.


