“BELIEVERS HELPING BELIEVERS”

As a young believer, I one day was speaking enthusiastically to an older brother about the Gospel and about the Lord. He listened respectfully and contributed to the conversation occasionally. After a while he calmly informed me that if I intended to work for the Lord, it would be better if I would remove my cap when speaking of spiritual things. I removed the cap I was wearing and proceeded. The incident remains in my mind and helps to make me more reverent and respectful toward the Lord. If it is winter and I'm outside in the cold, I would keep my cap on, which is reasonable, but the importance of showing reverence in one way or another remains. In this way the brother helped me a great deal.

It is very important for believers to help believers by engaging in conversations about how we can better follow the New Testament teachings. I Corinthians 16:15, 16, "I beseech you, brethren, that ye submit yourselves unto such, and to every one that helpeth with us, and laboureth." Having and maintaining reverence for God is a New Testament teaching and we must

not lose it. Hebrews 12:28, "Let us have grace, whereby we may serve God acceptably with reverence and godly fear."

When a group of believers lose their ability to converse about how they can be more Godly and more holy, there is great danger they will lose their identity as a people of God and also their spirituality. This must not happen to us. We must follow Titus 2:1-8 more closely. "That the aged men be sober . . . , the aged women likewise . . . , that they may teach the young women to be sober . . . , Young men likewise exhort to be sober minded." We cannot force others to be more sober, modest and spiritual, but we can enquire of them as to their thinking on the matter and suggest that, together, we try to do better.

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

MEMBERS ONE OF ANOTHER

When we become converted to Christ the Word teaches us to become assimilated into the church, which is Christ's body. All of us can testify of the wonderful loving warmth we felt from God's people when we first came into the faith. This warmth and love is to be ongoing!

As believers become one in Christ they gain strength. When brothers and sisters come together to comprise a larger body (the church of which Christ is the head), we benefit by the tie that binds our hearts in Christian love and we also find a safer haven from evil. By being united in Christ, we become stronger in our mutual efforts to face a devious, evil enemy—Satan!

Our spiritual life in Christ is not to be self-oriented. There are many people in our society who express belief in God, but who are emphatic in stating they don't need the church. To a great extent in modern American protestantism, it is stressed that one's religious faith is solely a private matter between God and man, and it should not interfere with one's personal choice of lifestyle. This is the opposite of true brotherhood and bears no resemblance to the Bible's pattern for the family of believers.

An individual believer's relationship to God, while personal in certain aspects, is also corporate (combined into a body). It is vertical (man to God and God to man) and horizontal (man to man, i.e. brotherhood). Because all true brothers and sisters in faith have God's Spirit within them, it is important that they relate to one another *spiritually in this unique horizontal relationship*. In a sense, as we relate to God's children, we are relating to God. Jesus said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done unto me" (Matt. 25:40).

When we approach God and serve Him in the brotherhood, we are beneficiaries of each other's strengths and experiences. Such a support group can help us in our understanding of the distinctions between

godliness and worldliness. It will also help keep us from error and from naively turning onto pathways that are spiritually harmful.

As fellow-believers in Christ, we are accountable not only to God, but to each other. We have many responsibilities to each other as "fellow-citizens" of the household of faith (Eph. 2:19): We are to share each other's joys and sorrows (1 Cor. 12:26); We are to comfort one another (1 Thes. 5:11); We are to be subject one to another (1 Pet. 5:5); We are, lovingly and with meekness and patience, to admonish and exhort one another when necessary (Col. 3:16); And in our lifestyle we are not to offend one another (Rom. 14:21) or put a stumbling block or occasion to fall in our brother's way (Rom 14:13); Nor are we to judge our brother (Rom 14:4).

The Bible is explicit in stating that God's people—those who have repented for their sins and have been truly converted—are members of Christ's body, the church. "Member" is defined as part of a larger whole. Our personal bodies are made up of many members, and so is the church; therefore, the members, in both instances, are to function cooperatively. "So we, being many, are one body in Christ, and every one members one of another" (Rom 12:5). In this composition, individual members are given various God-ordained gifts and talents. From this, everyone in the body can benefit. There are "many members" in one body (Rom. 12:4).

As brethren we are under an umbrella of kindly spiritual authority. We are placed in the body of Christ (the church) as God sees fit: "But now hath God set the members every one of them in the body, as it hath pleased him" (1 Cor. 12:18). Also we are to obey those in the brotherhood who rule over us and lead by example (Heb. 13:7, 17). And we are to submit one to another in the fear of God (Eph. 5:21). We are not independent entities walking on personal and isolated spiritual pathways.

Christ and the church are inseparable. Christ is the head of His body, the church (Eph. 5:23). We are members one of another. As a part of a body we cannot separate ourselves from this body and assert that we are following the Bible's pattern. If we go our own way or begin to "do our own thing" we are like a physical body part trying to exist on its own without benefit of all the various parts of the body being perfectly joined together.

The "unity of brotherhood" concept helps to perpetuate the faith from generation to generation. Keeping the faith and passing the torch to succeeding generations is very important—and especially so in our time when relativism and rationalism tend to undermine any type of absolute beliefs.

The enemy of our souls (Satan) is determined to undermine the virtues which are essential for a body of believers to thrive. Through the ages his goal has been to send individualism into the church. His tactic is to do it through seepage, not in a noticeable flow. To resist Satan, and to protect the holy church, we are to be obedient children, not fashioning ourselves after our former lusts (1 Pet. 1:14).

We are to be one bread and one body (1 Cor. 10:17). The concept, spiritually, of becoming one bread can be likened to physical bread. In making bread, a baker takes various ingredients, mixes them, kneads them (presses into a mass), and then bakes the dough into loaves.

Spiritually, we come as various individuals into the church. We are kneaded as we become crucified with Christ and the old man is pressed down. Finally, as the old man dies, and we come into the warmth of the Spirit and the brotherhood (the baking), we are blended into one bread and one body. Our fleshly individualism (the old Adam) is destroyed and we become yielded unto God (Rom. 6:11, 13), and only then do we truly function as members one of another according to the biblical pattern.

European Board History and Update

The European Board is one of four boards functioning under the jurisdiction of the World Relief Committee. As its name implies, the purpose is to work with our brethren in Europe, most particularly with humanitarian aid. Any efforts which pertain to spiritual matters are assigned to the Mission Committee, including the building of churches. But, because of the nature of our efforts with brethren in Europe, the World Relief European Board also cooperates with the Mission Committee on projects which involve church building.

In an effort to help our American brethren understand more fully what is happening, and to inform you of how your funds are being used, we will have a series of articles on these pages in the next few months. We hope that they will be of interest to you.

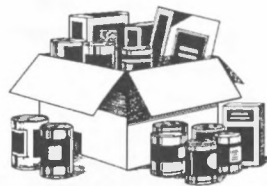
After the fall of communism, the borders between the east and west European countries opened, allowing brethren in and out. The 70 years of oppression took a heavy toll on everyone, including our brethren. When it became possible for people to pass from one country to another, and even before the borders were fully opened, brethren from western Europe established contacts with those in the eastern bloc countries. As a result of this, efforts to help the needy and suffering began.

Romania

Members of our faith have lived in Romania for many decades. Typical of eastern bloc countries, borders have changed over the years, and what was once one country now is in another. Romania is no exception. In fact, what is now the Ukrainian province of Bukovina, where we have several churches, was once considered a part of Romania, and formerly of the Austrian-Hungarian empire. This political instability, plus wars and

oppressive regimes have taken a heavy toll upon our struggling brethren. By the grace of God, they managed to keep their faith alive by meeting in small groups in homes during the strict regimentation. Although the flame of faith flickered in these distant lands, it did not go out, and today is flourishing.

Presently there are 38 congregations in Romania with five elders having the oversight. The telephone connections are workable, and there are fax machines in certain locations, making it possible to keep close contact. For



several years, regular shipments of material aid have gone into the country from Bluffton, IN each month. With recent availability of goods locally, programs like this are being reviewed. Nonetheless, the amount of assistance provided has been very beneficial to these struggling souls, and all involved appreciate the support of our brethren in America. By God's grace, they have built 6 new churches in Romania, and others are planned.

Ukraine

Since 1991, six or more shipments of foodstuffs and clothing went from Breidenbach, Germany, to the brethren in Ukraine. The World Relief Committee has participated both physically, by sending Americans to go along, and financially to help make these shipments of much needed essentials possible.

Hungary & Slovakia

Hungary and Slovakia are beginning to get established as democratic nations, and our brethren there have no pressing physical needs. We have been assisting brethren in these countries as well as in Germany to build churches.

Evaluation Trip

A group representing the World Relief and Mission Committees visited Europe in June and early July of this year for the purpose of evaluating past efforts and planning for future ones.

Elder Brothers Gene Marti, Ed Aeschleman, and Bro. Andy Hunyady traveled in Romania for five days. They visited a number of churches, and brethren, staying in homes. They observed several vehicles that had been purchased for use in delivering food packages, attending church functions, etc. Needs exist for 2 more, which have been approved by the European Board. A full report of church building activities will be covered in a future issue. Estimated funds necessary to provide a place of worship for each of the congregations needing buildings in Romania are \$159,000 total.

On June 16, this group traveled to Budapest where they were joined by Bros. Gene Lehman and Louis Bikadi. Friday, June 17, was spent in meeting with representatives from Yugoslavia, Ukraine, Slovakia, and Hungary in separate groups. Each group outlined the needs in their country, and explained local situations.

On Saturday, June 18, brethren from across Europe sat together in one group, and the overall program was reviewed. Topics of discussion included material aid and assistance in building churches, printing hymnbooks and Bibles, etc. Doctrinal issues were not discussed. The American brethren found these meetings very productive, and returned

with much information for future decisions. There was a strong feeling of unity and harmony. Your support and prayers in these endeavors are very much appreciated.

Report of the Meeting with Yugoslavian Brethren

Representatives from the Mission Committee met in Budapest, Hungary on June 17, 1994 with members of the Relief Committee from Yugoslavia and several of their elders. A cordial feeling of brotherhood was evident and issues were openly discussed. Languages used were Serbian, Hungarian, German, and English. In spite of the difficulties of translation, much valuable information was gathered which will be used for future planning.

Funds from the U.S. which have been sent through Szeged, Hungary have reached Serbia. A report was given of fund balances, and future needs were estimated. Throughout this report, one must keep in mind that the political situation in this troubled land is a major obstacle. In spite of this, the brethren assured us that physical needs for all of their members and friends are being met at this time.

Because of the war many young people have taken the opportunity to leave the country. Due to decreasing membership, 30 older churches were sold, and the funds used to repair the remaining ones. They believe the selling of these buildings leaves the wrong impression, and has been a hindrance to the faith. So they don't intend to sell any more of the 100 church buildings that remain. They placed strong emphasis on spiritual efforts, which they view as much more important than material aid.

They requested funds for three new buildings and the renovation of six old ones, at an estimated cost of \$200,000 total. We are giving this matter serious attention, and will report again on the decisions as they are made.

Fuel for heating has been a problem since the UN embargo and the civil war, but has somewhat eased recently. They estimate 200 families will need aid for heating homes next winter. When we asked about home heating, we were told that in addition to heating



oil, they burn wood, plus they do not heat every room in the house. They were satisfied that the amounts requested from us were sufficient for their needs.

Presently they have two mini-vans and a station wagon which are used for visiting church members and distributing food and money. There is a dire need for several more vehicles, and this was approved during a conference call on July 12. Fuel is expensive, but it is available. Medications are acquired locally or brought in from western countries and distributed. Most of the believers are within a relatively small geographic area of Serbia, and communication with each other is possible. None of our

appealed to them for help. Distribution is always a problem due to lack of public transportation.

Since there is improvement in the economic situation, the Yugoslavian elders have decided to have a nationwide collection within Serbia for those in need, which includes money, food, and clothing. This collection is in progress. Many international powers are involved in their internal strife, and only God knows what the future will bring. The young men can serve in the military as non-combatants, but must serve twice as long as a regular soldier. As of now, none are in prison.

War damaged houses have been repaired on a temporary basis, and when the war is over, will be restored if possible.

Inasmuch as they now have fewer young people in their churches, the future for the faith in Yugoslavia is not as bright as in the west. The subject of trade schools and higher education was discussed, and their feeling is that at this time, nothing is practical until the situation becomes more stable.

They once more stressed to us that their primary concerns are for the spiritual side of the brotherhood, such as church buildings, transportation, Bibles, song books, etc. as opposed to material needs. Programs are presently in progress, supported by the Mission Committee, to reprint the "Zion's Harp", and also to furnish them Bibles, both in the Serbian language.

At this time, it is best that money as opposed to goods be brought into the country. This is risky, but possible. We have direct telephone and fax connections with them, and monitor the situation regularly.

The Mission Committee thanks all of you for your prayers and support. By God's grace, we must continue to assist in spreading the gospel of Jesus Christ and encourage the laborers in the fields that are white unto harvest.

Sermon . . .

(Continued from Page 40)

In this great land in which we have been privileged by the Almighty to have been born to have lived, it seems we have things so easy. Sometimes the easiness of things tends to pull us away from the price our redemption has cost us. We go about our duties unhindered by a government . . . most of us enjoy fairly good health . . . we have comfortable homes . . . we have wives and families and all the blessings God could ever give us. But sometimes these things tend to let us forget from whence all these blessings come. So hope that everyday, brothers and sisters and friends, too, we consider what God has done for us.

One song writer who was evidently a strong believer in Christ,

uttered these famous words in the brown books, "I Stand Amazed . . ."

I stand amazed in the presence
 Of Jesus the Nazarene
 And wonder how He could (ever)
 love me,
 A sinner condemned, unclean.

How could He have done it? You and I were at one time sinners, brethren. We were condemned. We were unclean. We were filthy. But He saw us and when we cried out to Him from the need of our soul's bosom, "Help, for mercy and forgiveness!", He heard us. Then the song writer goes on to say:

For me it was in the garden
 He prayed; Not my will, but Thine.
 He had no tears for His own griefs
 (because He was sinless)
 But (He shed) sweat drops of blood
 for mine.

He did this for you, brothers and sisters, and for me, and for you, friends. He did this for you . . . that you and I could escape the damnation of hell. Then the song writer goes on to say:

He took my sins and my sorrows
 (burdens),
 He made them His very own;
 He bore the burden to Calvary
 And suffered and died alone.

Forsaken even by His Father, when He hung on the cross and darkness engulfed the earth, He cried, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" (Mark 15:34) Even the Son of God presented the question to the Father, "Why?" "Why did this calamity have to befall Me?" But He bore it. I think at that moment, He was indeed forsaken of God.

When He bore the sins, He became sin in our stead.

Sin and God have diametrically opposed since the beginning of time. They will forever be opposed to each other. But Christ became sin though He knew no sin in the eyes of a righteous God. That's when He bore the weight and the burden.

The Scripture does not mention very much about Christ's physical anguish when He suffered on the

cross. But it was the anguish of His soul, that is outstanding. The old prophet Isaiah caught the beauty and the lamentableness of that dramatic sight when he said, "The Father saw the travail of His soul, and He was satisfied."

When God saw His Son and heard His cry of anguish, "Why hast thou forsaken me?", God was then satisfied that here was the price that He could accept for the sins of mankind. The Father's heart was moved with compassion when he saw His Son crying out, "My God, My God." (Mark 15:34)

After this lamentable, pathetic sight, then Jesus, when He recognized He had completed the Father's will, addressed Him again as "Father." He said, "Father, into thy hands, I commend my Spirit." (Luke 23:46) "It is finished . . . and (He) gave up the ghost." (John 19:30)

What a glorious way for the Son of Man to leave this world in the eyes of mortal man. But in the eyes of God, it was the victory! It was the victory!

Then the Roman soldiers came along and broke the legs of the two malefactors to be sure they were dead on the Sabbath day. But when they came to Christ to break His bones, He was dead already, so instead of breaking His bones that the Scripture might be fulfilled, "A bone of Him shall not be broken," John 19:36, they pierced His side with the sword. From that side, flowed the blood – the atoning blood whereby your sins and my sins could be blotted out.

The water of which Christ Himself spoke when He lived, "Within you there shall spring up a well of water, springing up to life eternal." That water flowed from His rib and side after He had paid the price for sins; but not before.

There is a lovely parallel here, brethren and friends, the blood of Christ avails us after we have repented and brought our sins to light. Then the blood of Christ washes them away; but not before. The sinner who lives in sins is not the recipient of the blood of Christ washing away yours sins until such time as he has brought his sins to light . . . confess them that they

could be wrought in God, then God sees that blood of His beloved Son.

He hears the cry of anguish from His Son, "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do." (Luke 23:34) Then the procedure and the process of forgiveness and conversion begins to enact itself in hearts of penitent men and penitent women. Then after our sins have been forgiven, brothers and sisters, then our great God issues to us that tremendous message: "Peace be unto thee. Go and sin no more, lest a worse thing come unto thee."

What could be worse than living in sin? Evidently to have been converted and then to go back to the wallowing mire is even worse than to have been born in sin and not to have been relieved of that sin in the first place.

So we have a precious pearl to guard, brothers and sisters, but we can by His grace be overcomers. God would not have allowed His beloved Son to perish if He was not going to, with that means, provide the grace for us to endure faithful until life's end. It is possible, if we look to Him always in faith believing, that He will see us through.

The Word tells us so emphatically: ". . . he that cometh to God must (first of all) believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently see (after) him." (Hebrews 11:6) Brothers and sisters, you and I have gone through that frame of mind and when we were under conviction of our sins and saw the repercussion of sin, we believed there was a God. And we cried out, not for justice but for mercy!

We knew we were guilty of death. "The wages of sin is death," (Romans 6:23), and that has never been annulled. That conviction has never been lifted and we knew we were guilty. We deserved death but we cried for mercy. When our great God saw this plea coming from our soul's deep need, He was moved. You and I, brothers and sisters, moved the heart of God.

To the unconverted in our midst, if there be any, you, too, through a repentance, as a result of the conviction of your sin and your removedness from God, can move the Father heart of God to the point

that He will reach out and grasp your unclean hand; and remove from you your sins when you bring them to light and belch them out to get rid of them because you sense they are separating you from God.

He will eventually lead you to the green Gospel pastures and by the still water of life and will convert you from a child of the devil to a child of His. Dost thou believe this, beloved friends, that this is true?

Jesus died for all mankind. "All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way: and the Lord hath laid on him (on His beloved Son) the iniquity of us all." (Isaiah 53:6) "And when the stripes (and by His bruises) we are healed." (Isaiah 53:5)

So dear friend, if Satan is beguiling you with the thoughts, "You can't repent," he is a liar. If you want to be deceived by a liar, that is up to you; but you will reap the reward a liar has to give in eternity too. Why not deal with :

. . . a God who is truthful.

. . . A God who is faithful.

. . . A God who gave you the breath of life.

. . . A God whose will it is that no soul should perish?

Why not repent and believe the Gospel?

Jesus Christ said, "Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." (Luke 13:3) That hasn't changed. I hope, brothers and sisters, you and I are thankful that a goodly number of our youth have been exposed to this doctrine, where we recognize that we were sinners. But finally the Word of God reminded us what the fate of the sinner was; and we feared the repercussions.

Oh, King Solomon said it so wisely, "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom." (Psalm 111:10) I am so thankful that in my younger days I was exposed to the preaching of the gospel of salvation by faithful brothers who were no great orators; but who were men of God of whom it could be said, "They loved the Lord."

They loved the Lord. If we love the Lord, brothers and sisters, I am convinced God can and will use us if we love Him with all our heart,

with all our soul, with all our mind, with all that is with us is. That means exactly what it says. We must put Him first in our lives. We can if we have been forgiven of our sins. We are so grateful.

We will want to, out of a pure heart that has been cleansed and sanctified, obey His Word. Then God adds the blessings to our every endeavor. What a lovely thought! We do nothing. He does it all! We merely humbly believe and obey His Word and then God does the rest.

So we find at the wedding (while Jesus lived), He turned the water into wine. A very simple task for Jesus to do. But I think He wanted to reveal to these people that He had all power on earth and in heaven. These were merely physical witnesses of His greater power. Even Jesus' own people – the Jewish people in particular; for He would elevate Himself to the kingship while He yet lived and would establish Israel as a dominating government in the world circles but He didn't do that.

He said, "My kingdom is not of this world; I didn't come for that purpose. I did not come to elevate people in this world; but I came to make them candidates for the kingdom of God." He turned the tables on His own people. He allowed Himself the cruel excruciating death on the cross for their sakes and for your sakes and for my sake. This proves to us the human inability of mankind to grasp the depth and the unsearchable riches of the love of God.

Because He died and paid the price for sin, you and I are here this morning. If we would not be a converted people, we'd be doing something else this morning. I don't know. I shun to think what I'd be doing. But because He purchased us with His blood and gave us a desire to fellowship with the saints . . . to assemble around His Word . . . to be "made (to) sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus," (Ephesians 2:6), we find ourselves relaxing (that is, all except me). I trust you are enjoying the bountiful blessings of God that He has for His sons and His daughters and the blessings He has in store for

the friends of the truth who gather from Sunday to Sunday.

We know that there is a desire in your heart to become a son or a daughter of God. We know the power that withholds you from coming to God. It is the power of the devil: self-pride and self-ego. All these things are not attributes; they are hindrances. But they can be defeated. They can be defeated.

The ruler of the wedding tasted the wine that was served at the latter end of the wedding feast. He said, "This is unusual. We generally serve the best wine first; but you saved the best until the last." I believe that's the way God and His time schedule have reserved time for you and me. He saved the best to the last.

He finally sent His beloved Son. In the olden times "he spoke to the people by the prophets and now He sent His beloved Son. We have the record . . . His having been here . . . of His having lived . . . of His having died . . . of His having been resurrected . . . of His having been rejoined with the Father again in heaven. This is really what life is all about.

We will be victorious over death and over the grave. That's the hope that guides and instills in the hearts of His beloved daughters and His beloved sons. Without that hope, life is vain, life is bored, life is nothing, friends, if you have not this hope. What is life? If you have to look forward to nothing but a separation from God and from everything that is beautiful, that is a tormenting thought. But that is exactly the fear and the psychological domain the unconverted man lives in.

After life then what? That's the fear that Christ came to take away. He came to implant in the hearts of men and women the hope that after this life there is a life eternal. A house not made by human hands but eternal in the heavens indoctrinated, instituted and preserved by God Himself for that man and that woman who loves Him with all that is within him is.

We can't love Him, friends, until we know Him. We can't know Him until we feel the wrath of God upon our former sinful way. We

can't rejoice in something we've never tasted. I couldn't rejoice in the fellowship of the Forrest, IL, brethren until I had been here and knew what it was. I had been here before and I knew it was good, but now I can go back and encourage the brethren, "It's still there. God's people still dwell at Forrest; I can sense it."

So it is, friends, with the gift of salvation. Until you taste it, you cannot know. This is one of the great intricacies of the wisdom of God to have reserved this experience on an individual basis. There have never been mass conversions. That's an individual matter betwixt you and betwixt the Creator.

What could be more delightful, more joy and peace created, than when we to God our Father, our lives we do concentrate?

Men drive for thousands of miles to be in the company of kings and statesmen of nations. Why, you and I can be sons and daughters of God in the privacy of our own homes. We can have the Spirit of God indwell us and direct us.

What does this do to us, brothers? It makes us not boast; it humbles us when we think that the God of heaven, the God of earth, would condescend from His majestic throne of glory and find a place in the cleansed and purified hearts to dwell.

If God and His beloved Son be dwelling in our hearts, then comes into parley the saying, "If God be for us, who can be against us?" (Romans 8:31) If He is dwelling in our heart, He will drive out the evil thoughts that sometimes engulf our minds. He will forestall the evil spirits that try to make inroads in the believer's life. We will say with the song writer: "Though sorrows engulf me, though sea billows roll; I say to myself, 'My Father, it is well with my soul.'"

Someday that soul will either be rejoined with God in eternity or separated from Him in eternity. One of these two destinies. God gave us that soul, He gave us (it seems to me) the insight to make the determination as to whether or not He is indeed God and whether we want to respect and reverence His high and holy name. Or

whether we want to say, "Well, I'm getting along quite well; I've been given a fair amount of intelligence, a good job, a nice home; I'm doing a fine job."

That's a lamentable state when man makes that admission. He almost falls in the category which the Psalmist wrote: "The fool hath said in his heart, There is no God." (Psalm 14:1) What a lamentable state! But it seems to me the unconverted man who rejects the council of God, is saying that. The Word calls that man a fool. That's a pretty sad title, isn't it, when God labels the man who forgets God as a "fool"?

We can fool all of the people some of the time and some of the people all the time, but we can't ever fool God. It can't be done . . . His eyes are all searching . . . His ears are all hearing . . . His arms have not been shortened . . . His love has not diminished. Beloved friends, God loves you!

Jesus Christ put it this way: "I came not to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance." (Luke 5:32) If there would have been one righteous person in the world, Christ would not have had to die; but there wasn't any. There was not a righteous person in the world. God said this in the Old Testament history: "The thoughts of his heart (the mind of man) was only evil continually!" (Genesis 6:5) What a lamentable sight as God beheld His creatures - our ancestors!

You and I, before we are converted, have only evil thoughts continually. God could have said, "Away with them!", but He didn't do it. Why didn't He? Because within the bosom of your soul and my soul, He breathed a counterpart of Himself and He could not stand the thought of seeing that part of Him being cast out into outer darkness even though we deserved it because our forefathers rejected the council. They disobeyed. They believed the devil who said, "You won't die if you eat the fruit of that forbidden tree; you won't die." Well, they did die spiritually and later they died physically because they just didn't believe.

That is the great sin of unbelief

that keeps men from the kingdom of God. So I hope, brothers and sisters, that you and I by the grace of God, who have attained to the status of sons and daughters of God, will appreciate what He has done for us . . . that we will be thankful . . . that we will keep ourselves, by His grace, unspotted from the world.

"Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction." (James 1:27) How many times we fail! To keep himself unspotted from the world, that is pure religion. That is the definition that God gives in His Word and we fall short, brothers. That's why we have to cry for mercy, for forgiveness and for help.

It's not child's play being a child of God. It takes the grace of God coupled with our best effort; and the balance is heavy on the grace of God. We have very little to contribute but we do have to exert the effort.

I think of the little man Zacchaeus. He heard the Christ was coming his way and, because he was such a little fellow in stature, he just couldn't get close to Christ. The thronging mob prevented him. So what does Zacchaeus do? He was a rich man, too. Zacchaeus climbed a tree preceding the throng that was following Christ because he wanted to see Jesus. This must have looked a little silly to me. To see a common man of Forrester, let's say, climb upon a tree to see a prominent man come along because he couldn't see him because he was little. But Zacchaeus wasn't concerned about what people thought. He wanted to see Christ.

Friends, once you reach the point you don't care what people think and you cry out to God, things will happen in your lives. If you have some reservations, you are not going to get any place. Christ made no reservations when He died on the cross. He didn't say, "Well, I won't die for that fellow out there . . . he is a little bit too bad." He didn't say that.

He just said, "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do." (Luke 23:34) He pleaded for the world - past, present and fu-

ture! That is the sinner who yet remains and they don't know what they are doing.

That's why God can wink at the sins of the unconverted man when he comes in penitence because he really didn't know what he was doing. He didn't really recognize how much he was rebelling against the will of God. But when he allows the impact of the love of God to weigh down into his bosom, and he senses that because of his sin, he is separated from God Almighty. This is a fearful thing. The Word puts it this way: "It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God." (Hebrews 10:31) "For our God is a consuming fire." (Hebrews 12:29)

How thankful we are, brethren, the Word did this for you and for me. It brought us under conviction and condemnation. After the condemnation through an upright spirit - the crying out to Him, repenting, bringing our deeds to light, confession of our sins, making restitution where we had wronged our brother, or our sister, our friend, our mom, our dad, and our God - we were flooded with His peace. But only God can give a peace that passeth human understanding. Let's maintain, by the grace of God, that peace that we can go our way. As the song writer says:

"Stand up, stand up for Jesus,
Ye soldiers of the cross,
Lift high His royal banner,
It must not suffer loss;
From victory unto victory,
His army shall He lead,
'Till every foe is vanquished,
And Christ is Lord indeed."

That is what He will do for us, brothers and sisters, if we allow Him to lead us. Friends, we plead with you: "Today (when) you hear his voice, harden not your hearts." (Hebrews 4:7) This world has nothing to offer you in this life or in the world to come. You are eating the husks and not the corn . . . you're chewing the cob and not the sweet kernel, as long as you serve the god of this world. He has nothing for you but lies, deceit, heart break and sorrow.

Then in the world to come, a home with him where the beast

and the false prophet will be . . . "Where their worm dieth not, and the fire is not quenched . . ." (Mark 9:44) . . . where "there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth." (Matthew 8:12) Do you want to look forward to that, friends? I trust you don't.

I trust God will speak to your hearts today and remind you that, "The wages of sin is death: but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." (Romans 6:23)

I hope, brothers and sisters, that as our friends behold us, they will see in us the countenance of Jesus Christ our Saviour. I hope they will see in us: compassion, mercy, forgiveness, tenderheartedness, the love of God, the Light Divine! I hope our lights will bring forth the fruits that will lead them to repentance!

In the final analysis, it is the goodness of God, friends, that leadeth thee to repentance. It was the goodness of God, brothers and sisters, that led you and I to repentance. It was the goodness of God. That was the means of God Divine whereby mankind could be reconciled to Him. So long as we draw breath, at least on my part, I cannot comprehend the depth nor the magnitude of the Love of God! To think that He reached out and revealed to wretched me and to wretched you, brothers and sisters, our lost condition! When in that status of life, we beheld as it were the end.

We heard last night, Bro. Merrill read from Psalms 73, where the Psalmist said he beheld ungodly men and he almost became covetous of their status. They were rich . . . things were going good . . . they didn't even seem to worry about death. He was almost envious of them, but then he said that he went to the sanctuary and there God revealed to him the end of the ungodly men. And he praised God for that revelation.

So we trust this morning that as we have come to the sanctuary, God is revealing to us the end of the ungodly; and also the end of the righteous man. May His name be praised forever and ever world without end.

SERMON BY DECEASED BRO. URIEL C. GEHRING OF LEO, IN

John 2:1-22

We find, beloved, that the Son of God was exposed to marriages, to deaths, to births, to happiness, to sorrow, to joy, to grief, to remorse. The same things you and I are exposed to. God in His infinite wisdom saw fit to allow His Son to carry flesh and blood . . . to be tempted in every way like as you and I, and yet to be without sin. Then to use His Son as the Lamb of God who would take away the sins of the world.

This brother is beyond human comprehension of the love of God whereby He saw His creation basking themselves in the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eye and the pride of life, but still could see that if there were some means of salvaging them from the ruination of sin, He was going to provide that means. And He did; through His beloved Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord.

But before His Son paid the supreme sacrifice, He dwelt among men. He walked with them . . . He talked with them . . . He exposed Himself, and, by the grace of God, we believe, He was victorious in every situation.

In this particular episode in the life of Christ, we find there was a marriage in Cana; and Jesus was invited to the marriage. Marriages

have always been beautiful if undertaken in the fear of God. This, I believe, was a type of marriage that Jesus was invited to.

They served wine, the lovely fruit of the vine, at the marriage feast. When they wanted wine, it says, the mother of Jesus said to Jesus, "They have no wine." (John 2:3) Jesus said to her, "Woman, what have I to do with thee? Mine hour is not yet come." (John 2:4)

Here, I believe, Jesus gently reminded his earthly mother that it was no longer her duty to give Him advice. He was now doing the will of His Father. He had a higher mission. He still respected His beloved mother, Mary, I'm sure, but He wanted her to know that he was now under the auspices of the will of God. His will was now to obey His Father and do those things His Father would have Him do.

This seems to me it would alleviate the unfortunate individuals who pray to Mary. She was the virgin whom God chose to bear forth His beloved Son. These very few words would indicated to me, I think to all of us, that when He said, "Woman, what have I to do with thee? Mine hour is not yet come." John 2:4, that man is advised not to pray to Mary; but to

pray to God, the Father through Jesus Christ, His beloved Son.

Oh, the error of the wisdom of man in supposedly searching out the wisdom of God. "There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death." (Proverbs 14:12) That is so true, brethren. Praise be to God that we, by grace through faith, have been enlightened to the proper method and mode of receiving the forgiveness of our sins through repenting and believing the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Now we find ourselves, brethren and sisters, if we stand in grace, uncondemned and free from the blight of sin . . . free from the grief of sorrow and the wages of sin, which is eternal death.

We find our selves, brethren, in the most lovely position in a relationship with the Almighty, all because that Jesus, the Son of God, became willing to become sin in our stead, though "He knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him." (II Corinthians 5:21) I hope we never forget that, brothers and sisters. It does something to our inner bosom when we consider what He has done for us! The price He paid!
