I can believe there was a sigh of relief as the brethren would greet each other after maybe five hours of effort.

The congregation might sing "The Lord Will Provide" and then we could be back at 1995. As it was then, so it is now with the Word preached, hymns sung, and the love of our Lord pouring forth from Heaven bringing about peace in our heart.

As we reminisce about the days past, we can learn good lessons and that is that we get out of something what we put into it.

Effort, attitude, love, care, admonishment, empathy, discerning of the spirits (often mistaken for judgment) are but a few things which will seem very important to us as we think about the faith of our fathers.

It all started with God sending His beloved Son to earth for our salvation. Oh, the blessings of placing our trust in a risen Lord! As we look at the empty tomb (thought to be the sight pictured on the cover), we realize in small part the effort and love extended to the human family by our Lord and Saviour. True love for Him in return is all He asks of those He died for.

We are humbled when we view from our heart that empty tomb, and those precious words, "And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also." (John 14:3).

Light From The Word



Writings based on God's Word

Part V in a series of articles on family unity deals with teaching by example and presents a few general guidelines about human nature as it relates to discipline within the family.

Although we do not model our lives after the imperfect example of man, it is encouraging to read about the faithful servants who followed the Lord. The Lord said of Abraham "For I know him, that he will command his children and his household after him and they shall keep the way of the Lord, to do justice and judgment;..." (Gen. 18:19). Paul taught us that we are to be examples for others, "...be thou an example of the believers, in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity" (I Tim. 4:12).

As parents, we serve as powerful examples, either positive or negative, to our children. We must carefully examine our lives and eliminate carelessness, inconsistency and discord from our lives to avoid the negative impact that these would have on our children. Husbands and wives must be in godly harmony "...that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment" (I Cor. 1:10).

This admonition is also for the church. If children see inconsistency, division or a lack of harmony in the home or in the church, it causes confusion and provides Satan an opportunity to turn them away from our primary objective: teaching our children to serve God.

Although it is probably not possible to give an exact "recipe" for teaching our children, it certainly is possible to find many general principles and specific guidelines, based upon the Word of God, that can be very beneficial to parents as they deal with the task of raising children in an evil and powerfully influential world. Many of these scriptural principles and guidelines are contrary to what the world and many "professionals" would have us believe.

A few general statements about godly

order in the home and some principles of discipline as they relate to human nature may help prepare our hearts for more specific Bible teachings that believers should follow.

The scripture makes it very clear that a family is not a democracy. Parents must work together with the father being the leader and the mother giving loving support. This does not mean that we do not listen to our children nor does it mean that we do not consider their feelings and wishes. It simply means that parents are responsible to see that the atmosphere of the home is one of godliness and that the decisions that are made are based upon the Word of God. Perhaps it is realistic to say a family should be a theocracy, an organization ruled by God.

People (children) tend to repeat activities that get them what they want. If parents, or other authority figures, bow to pressure and give in to requests or demands brought on by unacceptable behavior, the likelihood of unacceptable behavior being repeated is increased. We need to overcome the temptation to "buy" short term peace at times of difficulty brought on by inappropriate behavior. This can send a strong signal to our children that we are unwilling or unable to take a firm stand on matters of right and wrong and could lead to further rebelliousness and lack of submission.

It is generally not the severity of punishment that gets results, but the certainty of it that changes behavior. If we are inconsistent in enforcing the rules our children are to follow, they soon learn that most of the time there will be no consequences for improper behavior. This sends an unclear signal to a child and increases the likelihood that the child will ignore or defy the parents, causing significant conflict and confusion in the home.

Discipline and punishment are not the same thing. Proverbs 22:6 teaches us about training a child (discipline) while Proverbs 23:13 emphasizes the need for correcting (punishing) a child. Punishment can be part of discipline but it is certainly not the entire process. It is one way (among many) of enforcing discipline.

Parents should anticipate changes in their children's need for training and correction as they mature. As an infant, a child makes no decisions, other than to announce hunger or discomfort, and takes no responsibility for his behavior. Parents are totally responsible for the care and welfare of the child and make all the decisions that affect the child. As a child matures, that situation gradually changes until ultimately the child becomes an adult and makes his own decisions and should accept responsibility for those decisions. The time during which this transition occurs can be guite trying as parents struggle with the realization that their child must begin making more and more decisions and the fear that they will not always make wise choices.

Not all children learn at the same rate and not all children respond to the same techniques of training. An additional complicating factor is that techniques that work with a child at one point in time may not work with the same child at a different time. This can be a frustrating experience for parents but if we are sensitive to the changes that are taking place in our children's lives, we will be better prepared to successfully respond to these changes.

Although it is not realistic to expect all children to follow the same pattern as they mature, it is likely that most children will experience several phases of maturity, and parents need to be aware of these phases. The ages of these changes vary from child to child but fit roughly into the following categories: birth to three years old; four to six years old; seven to twelve years old; thirteen to eighteen; and over eighteen years old.

The examples we set for our children and the clear, consistent expectations we have for them will help reduce some of the anxieties and uncertainties we face as we work to set our children on a godly path of life.

APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN Mission Committee

... The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few; Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest. Matthew 9:37-38



A large portion of the V funds received by the Mission Committee is helping build churches of our faith, here in the USA as well as in other countries. In this article, we want to share with our readers some of the projects which are ongoing as of this time. We will begin at home.

Churches in the USA

We believe that it is important and scriptural that in all our efforts, spiritual as well as material, we begin at home within the household of faith.Our brethren in smaller congregations are generous supporters of our ongoing work, but sometimes when they need to make a large expenditure for their own facilities, it can strain the resources of their small group of people. In cases such as this, your Mission Committee usually becomes involved. Any member of our committee will be glad to accept your suggestions of where assistance could be needed.

Garden Grove, Iowa

This small congregation recently had a need for some fairly expensive maintenance projects on their building. It was necessary to replace the furnace and make other improvements. The Mission Committee is glad to provide some of the needed funds, even though the local congregation may be reluctant to accept assistance.

Nashville, Tennessee

For several years, a small group of brethren and friends have been worshipping together in this city. As they have no resident minister, brethren from other churches serve them on a rotating basis. Last year,

> we provided \$31,000 for the purchase and remodeling of a small church building. They have been working diligently

on this building, and it can now be used for worship services. There is a need for some expansion of the facility, and we have approved an additional contribution of up to \$20,000. We should also mention that the Mission Committee also provides *Bibles, Zion's Harps,* and *Hymns of Zion* for all new congregations.

San Diego, California

The Mission Committee has been making contributions to this congregation to help cover the cost of the rent on the building they have been using for worship services. Lease payments are very high in this area, and we are thankful that the Lord has provided that they can now meet in their new building.

Portland, Oregon

This congregation recently had an opportunity to sell their building and purchase another in a more desirable location. As funds were needed on short notice, we wired them \$45,000 to close the transaction. More will be needed to make the building suitable for worship services. The local congregation has pledged to pay these costs over a period of years.

However, since the money was needed immediately, we agreed to provide up to \$53,000 for this purpose, and as future contributions come into their building fund, they will be forwarded to the Mission Committee.

Church Building in Europe

Breidenbach, Germany

We reported on the dedication of a new church in this town in a previous issue. The Mission Committee approved another \$50,000 contribution to their costs which has been sent from the European Building Fund. This makes a total of nearly \$277,000 that we have contributed to this project which cost around \$1.1 million. Many European brethren volunteered their labor, but costs in Germany are much higher than in Eastern Europe.

One of the reasons this building was necessary was due to the large number of East European brethren who moved here for economic reasons, crowding the existing building. Many of these immigrants had large families and small resources, which put a strain on the established congregation. Even with the help we have given them, they had to execute a large loan, and could use additional help repaying what has been borrowed.



APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN World Relief

As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith. Galatians 6:10



O n February 22nd, 35 people from 9 states visited Juarez, Mexico, as the 12th Medical/ Dental work team to the area. This large city is host to a great many poor people. The visitor is always moved upon seeing them rummaging through the garbage dumps in search of something to sell. Often children are observed eating what they find in this place. Sights such as this sink deep into the heart, causing gratitude for our great blessings.

But when thou makest a feast, call the poor, the maimed, the lame, the blind: and thou shalt be blessed; for they cannot recompense thee: for thou shalt be recompensed at the resurrection of the just. St. Luke 14:13-14

Continuing an effort begun some years ago, the group set up in various places to minister to those having such great needs. Presenting a united effort, they dispersed health kits, dental care, physical therapy and medicine under the direction of three physicians. They also assisted in bringing comfort and counseling to depressed persons. The variety of the team brought many different talents, all of which were put to use in this ministry to the poor and sick.

Moving into a location, the team would set up a clinic, while those with needs waited patiently to be seen and treated, grateful beyond words for the help they received.

Bibles Eagerly Received

The team gave many Spanish Bibles to the people, who were eager and grateful to receive them. They also had Bible Story Books for children. They received some personal accounts of how lives had been touched and moved to seek the Savior as a result of these books. As team members entered a new area, to their surprise, the people requested more Bibles than physical and material care. This encouraged the teams even more than the actual work they performed.

Over the five days, they worked in a number of different areas of the city. The medical team saw and treated 863 children and 577 adults, while the dental team saw 349 patients. Included in the group were four young boys aged 9 to 15 years, who made many Mexican friends, finding that the language was not a barrier.

Lessons in Faith

Many obstacles with customs had to be overcome, but our brethren found that each day they had sufficient supplies for the day. It was a lesson for them in the way the Lord can provide one day at a time. With a spirit of humility, members of the group made themselves available, and the Lord gave the means and grace for each task. With plenty of interpreters, they could communicate easily with the Mexican folks.

Although only 35 persons from our churches actually participated on the front line of action, it was by the support of hundreds of faithful folks on the home front who made up the various types of kits and supplies, plus furnished the financial assistance necessary that everything could function. The World Relief Committee and the Mexico Board certainly extend their gratitude to all of you for helping make a work like this one possible. God is your reward.

New Equipment Helps

Some new dental equipment was brought in safely on Monday and used throughout the week. It immediately increased the efficiency and ease of the work, and remains stored on the Mexican side of the border to be used for future team efforts. We are very thankful. Should it be possible to acquire an additional chair, it could be put to good use when two dentists go.

In four of the five locations, the dental team found it necessary to work outside because the shelter available needed to be used for privacy by the doctors. Two chairs modified by DMI were mobile and made it possible for one dentist to do fillings while another did emergency pain relief, which was mostly extractions. People have such limited access to dental care that their problems can only be solved in this manner.

Opportunities for Service

This Medical/Dental work team effort is part of the ongoing work of the Mexico Board. It is closely monitored by the World Relief Committee and financed by the funds which come from our loyal brethren and friends. Opportunities for service do exist, and we encourage anyone who has an interest in participating to contact their local Treasurer-Representative.

We will report next month on a building team which worked in the same area. In order to continue these efforts, we must have the support of the brotherhood, and the blessings of God. Please pray for the work!

"THE ALMIGHTY GOD IS OUR REDEEMER"

Sermon by Bro. David E. Graf of Akron, OH

John 5:19-47

What a blessing that we can open this Word of Life and even find the very words that were recorded that was spoken by the Lord Jesus Himself. It applies so very clearly to our life and can answer the very questions that we have from day to day and it can show us the way so we can find this eternal life.

I think that is the reason why every one of us is at this place this morning. We want to go to Heaven, don't we? We want to find that eternal life. We know that the Word of Truth is spoken here. It is our way to come and visit this congregation, where, I am sure, many of you have not met me before. Yet the brothers have encouraged me this morning and said, "Speak the truth." What a joy that is to think that there is a desire here to hear the truth. There is nothing I can bring or would bring or there is nothing anyone could bring.

The Word teaches us God is not a respecter of persons, but God wants us to be obedient to His Word. (See Acts 10:34).

We have the privilege that we can read the Word of Truth and we have the privilege to speak the Word of Truth. We don't have to add anything to it and we certainly don't want to take anything away from it. We just want to dwell on the Word of God.

Here we read this morning the words that Jesus spoke and words that apply to our lives. In the beginning we read here in the nineteenth verse about the Son doing those things that the Father does. We often see that in the earthly sense, don't we? Many times the son will follow his father in an occupation, especially we might think that on the farm. We see many who begin to help their father at a young age, and possibly follow in the things that he would do.

Again, I think this is an example that tells of heavenly things that Jesus often used, but then He was speaking of Himself and the Father in Heaven.

When we think of the Lord Jesus Christ, we think of God...the One that is infallible and is perfect and One that has all power and One that has done so much for us.

Yet, in reading those words, we can see that Jesus Himself made Himself to be the Son of God, and made Himself to be a notch lower than God, we might say, because He said that everything that He had and what He taught came from God. He could do nothing unless the Father had shown Him or taught Him that.

Then He told us, too, "For the Father loveth the Son, and sheweth him all things that himself doeth." (John 5:20). Because the Father loved His Son, He taught Him these things. Then because the Lord Jesus loves us, He is likewise teaching us and showing us these things that God the Father had shown unto Him.

"...and he will shew him greater works than these, that ye may marvel. For as the Father raiseth up the dead, and quickeneth them; even so the Son quickeneth whom he will." (John 5:20-21). This word "quickeneth" is used oftentimes in the Bible. We understand that it means bringing back to life...bringing to life those that are dead. We know there are various instances that we can read of when Jesus, as a man, did bring people back to life from death. We know that He raised up Lazarus and there were others that were physically dead and He would go and speak the Word and make it come forth and return to life.

Beloved ones, the Word is speaking here of a spiritual life. You know, every one of us were dead in sins. Perhaps some of us still are. Perhaps some of us are still walking under the power of Satan and we know there is sin in our life. We know there is that bond but we just can't break it. We don't seem to have the strength and power to be released from that. But we can come to life in God through Jesus Christ.

Even as it said here that He raised up the dead and quickeneth them. He brings them to life and so the Son will quicken whom He will. (See John 5:21). We might ask then, "Who will He bring to life?" It tell us that whoever would believe on Him and whoever is willing to become obedient, He will do this for us and bring us to life.

We also can see in some of these other verses where it speaks of another time of a resurrection. "Verily, verily, I say unto you, The hour is coming, and now is, when the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God: and they that hear shall live." (John 5:25). I think this speaks of the time when Jesus returns here to this earth.

When it is speaking of those who have lived and died in Him, the dead in Christ, we understand the Word tells us, they are going to hear His voice and they are going to arise and then those who are alive and remain can join them in the air and go to be forever with

the Lord. Isn't that a beautiful thought? That Jesus Christ, as He has promised in His Word, is one day going to return again and is going to appear in the clouds of glory.

As the Word tells us, there will be the sound of the trumpet and even a shout of the arch angel and we will see those dead rising from the grave and we can join them and go be with the Lord. These are beautiful thoughts and beautiful words that Jesus said to encourage the believers. He said that to encourage those whom He spoke to in His time. He said, "I say unto you. He that heareth my word, and believeth on him that sent me, hath everlasting life." (John 5:24). They are the ones that will hear the voice of the Son of God and will rise from the grave, or arise from wherever we might happen to be at that time. Don't we all want to be partakers of that?

We know that at that time. He is going to come and claim those who have already become His children. But how would we feel, even as we have often heard the Word of God, realizing that He was calling and inviting us and wanting to share this with us, and yet we rejected Him? How are we going to feel then on that day when we realize the Son of God has come to take His children home? I believe that not one who is in this place this morning would neglect this loving call of God and neglect this opportunity for salvation. The voice we heard today might be a voice to awaken us to this new life and quickening for the dead, spiritually speaking.

"For as the Father hath life in himself, so hath he given to the Son to have life in himself; And hath given him authority to execute judgment also, because he is the Son of Man." (John 5:26-27). When we read this word "judgment", it is a word that we kind of stand in awe, because the Word tells us different times about judgment.

We have the Word that teaches us that we are not to judge. We are not to judge one another, but we are supposed to leave the judgment to God. Here we read that the judgment was given to the Son of God. So we understand that the Word tells us that every one of us will stand before the judgment seat of Christ. God has given that judgment to Him and we will answer to Him what we have done in this life.

"Marvel not at this: for the hour is coming, in the which all that are in the graves shall hear his voice, And shall come forth; they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of damnation." (John 5:28-29).

It really doesn't leave us with a whole lot more to say, does it, because it is very clear and plain? There will be a separation. There might be some in the world that would think that they have done good. They have done good things so they could look forward to the resurrection, but, beloved ones, we know that we have to not only do good, or that the good that we would try to do ourselves, the Word tells us that it is as filthy rags. (See Isaiah 64:6).

We must be born again through Jesus Christ. We must repent. We must be forgiven of that past sinful life and have this blessed cleansing, and then we can consider ourselves, not that we are any good, but through the grace of God, we can be among those that the Word describes that have done good and have a hope of the resurrection of life.

If we neglect to repent and be

born again, we would be among those that have to face the resurrection of damnation. It is so clear and plain in this Word, beloved, and we hope and pray that there would not be any that would refuse Him.

Jesus said, "I can of mine own self do nothing: as I hear, I judge: and my judgment is just; because I seek not mine own will, but the will of the Father which hath sent me." (John 5:30). Again, He is expressing that He is there on a mission. God had sent Him to this earth and God had told Him what to speak, what to do and even told Him how to judge. He said, "I seek not mine own will, but the will of the Father which hath sent me." (John 5:30).

Loved ones, we recently went through the season of the year when we commemorate the suffering of Jesus at Calvary. His death, and His resurrection. When we consider His words here. "I seek to do the will of the Father which hath sent me," do we often enough consider what He did for us in seeking to do the will of the Father? We know how He went through that terrible agony and how He prayed there in the garden that if it would be possible for that cup to be removed from Him. But He said, "Nevertheless not my will, but thine be done." (See Matthew 26:39).

We understand that there was no other way...that this was the will of God and He had to suffer and He had to endure and lay down His life for us. Today we can stand here and we can rejoice that He was willing to do that and that we can proclaim God's blessed salvation. Also that we can say that there is a way that we can be saved and our sins can be removed because the blood that was shed there at Calvary is able to wash away those sins. Jesus told us that He bore the witness of Himself. It seems that those who resisted Him were always trying to catch Him at His word and trying to tell Him that He did not have a witness, or did not have support for what He was saying. We understand that their law said that the testimony of two men was true. If there were two, then it was accepted as a true testimony.

But Jesus is telling us that He had--even though He had the witness here on earth--He had John who had come and proclaimed to be a forerunner of Jesus. He had begun to teach the gospel of salvation. He had taught of repentance and had baptized, but Jesus said He had a greater witness than that of John. He had the witness of His Father in Heaven, of Almighty God.

He didn't take away from John's ministry because He said, "He was a burning and a shining light: and ye were willing for a season to rejoice in his light. But I have greater witness than that of John: for the works which the Father hath given me to finish, the same works that I do, bear witness of me, that the Father hath sent me." (John 5:35-36). How precious and how important these words are! Yes, it was wonderful when God inspired John to go out there in the desert and we see that many followed him there and many believed on his words and many came forth bringing fruits of repentance, as it tells us, and were baptized by John the Baptist. It tells us here, they were willing to "rejoice in his light." (John 5:35).

But now Jesus is telling us, "But I have greater witness than that of John: for the works which the Father hath given me to finish...". (John 5:36). Again, that He would go there to the extent of laying down His life for us. There is nothing greater that anyone could do to be a witness for God. But we are reminded, these words seem to speak louder even than the very words that we can speak. Jesus had come and He taught His glorious plan of salvation, healed the sick, raised the dead, and did the many miracles that He did, and yet if He had not been willing to go to the cross, the plan would not have been fulfilled.

It was that which He finally did that bore witness...the works that He did. In our life, we can speak wonderful words and we can profess to do many things, but if the witness isn't there, then there is no power. If the world cannot see through us that Christ is living in us, even without us speaking words, then we are seriously lacking that witness that Jesus here professed that He had, the witness of God being in Him.

He told us to "Search the scriptures; for in them ye think ye have eternal life." (John 5:39). This is still a good practice for us, to search the scriptures. There are so many teachings in there of eternal life, even from the very beginning of the Old Testament.

We know that at the time Jesus was here in speaking these words, that was all they had for scripture was the Old Testament. Yet, in those very scriptures, Jesus is proclaimed that He would come. We know that even from the very beginning in the Garden of Eden when man fell and sinned, God promised that one day there would be One who would bruise the serpent's head. It would be His Son Jesus who would walk here upon this earth.

We can see how it is prophesied how Jesus would come here upon this earth and become a Saviour for all mankind. We know that there are many prophecies that are yet unfulfilled, even of the Old Testament and of the New Testament that speak about His time (that we read about this morning) when those who could hear the voice of Jesus of when He would return again to receive His own unto us.

Jesus is telling those in His day to "Search the scriptures; for in them ye think ye have eternal life...And ye will not come to me, that ye might have life." (John 5:39-40).

They wanted to bend the scriptures around so that they could excuse themselves from believing in Jesus. How sad to think that today it still happens, that we could possibly take a portion of the Word and focus on one item and not on the whole Word. In so doing, we might lose the value of the teachings and we might not be able to find the whole plan of salvation. Even as Jesus said and proclaimed from the Old Testament on, do proclaim it.

He said, "And ye will not come to me, that ye might have life." (John 5:40). He is teaching us. We need to come to Him. We need to accept His words and His teachings. We need to become obedient to them, and we need to obey the entire Word of God, not to just choose out the things which might fit us or might seem to be easy for us and neglect those that take a little more sacrifice on our part.

Jesus said, "I am come in my Father's name, and ye receive me not: if another shall come in his own name, him ye will receive." (John 5:43). That is a warning to us, beloved. There are those who come in their own name and there are those that even come in our day and claim to be coming in the name of God. But they are deceivers. We know that Jesus warned

us very clearly to be aware of deception.

His disciples asked Him how it would be in the end times. They asked Him, "What will be the sign of His coming?" The very first thing He told them was to beware that ye be not deceived. That is a great danger that we face today. There are so many deceptions about those that would come and pervert the Word of God so that it loses power.

He asks, "How can ye believe, which receive honour one of another, and seek not the honour that cometh from God only?" (John 5:44). We don't want honor of men, do we? None of us would desire that but we want to bring honor to God and we want God to work within us.

He said here, "Do not think that I will accuse you to the Father: there is one that accuseth you...". (John 5:45). Here these people felt they had the law of Moses to back them up. They trusted in Moses. At one time, I believe, they even told Jesus, "We don't know who you are or where your words come from, but we have the words of Moses." Yet, Jesus could tell them that Moses had testified of Him.

He said, "For had ye believed Moses, ye would have believed me: for he wrote of me." (John 5:46). We rejoice as we read those words and go back into the Old Testament. Read the Song of Moses. It is very encouraging to see how God inspired so many thousands of years ago, a message that is still alive and timely today.

But He said, "But if ye believe not his writings, how shall ye believe my words?" (John 5:47). That is a question that we all need to answer. Can we reject the writings and words of God? Can we believe them?


It just comes to my mind that one scripture of the rich man and Lazarus that Jesus told us about. This poor man begged at the rich man's gate, and if I understand right, he desired even the crumbs that fell from his table. Requesting Bibles for those thirsty for God's Word in Nigeria, is G.M. Otumba. He writes:

"I am grateful to know you and to request you to help us for some free gift copies of God's Holy Word as this has today become our most serious problem to meet the needs of our Christian brothers and sisters who have not even money to buy nor any source of getting a free copy for themselves. It is good for people who are hungry for God's words to see it and to be able to read them. Remember, that those who are wise will shine like the brightness of the heavens and those who lead many to righteousness like the stars forever and ever. (Daniel 12:3). We would like you to send us Bibles in M-bags for this postal way of services are safer." (We do send all books overseas in Mbags, large canvas mail bags which need a minimum of 15 pounds of books going to one address. The rate is \$.72 a pound. A pew Bible is approximately one pound. A Hurlbut Bible story book is close to three pounds. The cost of postage in Nigeria has gone up tremendously. It was twenty times higher in 1993 than in the previous vear.)

Letters From Overseas

From the Philippines:

"I'm Gabriel Ngayao, a Bible school student in Bukidnon Fundamental Baptist Seminary. I am a son of a poor family, but I felt that God called me to serve Him in full time service. I decided to write unto you because in my studies I have difficulty due to lack of textbook and study Bible. I have been praying for choir piece materials....

The National Association of Evangelical Churches in Nigeria is going to prisons, refugee camps, and orphanage centers to distribute food, clothes, and Bibles.

"These people here had no access to Bibles for a full generation. They want Bibles every bit as desperately as a concentration camp victim wants nourishing food. There is no people in the world that is as hungry and desperate to have Bibles as these people. They will cherish even a single page torn from a community Bible....

This is a very formidable task that cannot be done alone. It

requires partnership. This is why we are appealing to you to help us with boxes of Bibles to distribute among them. The Lord's work is much more pleasant when one is helped by fellow servants of Christ such as yourself. May the Heavenly Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ bless the work of your hands and instill in you that genuine Christian love and understanding to help feed these hungry and fertile hearts with the Word of God."

A request for one Bible comes from Apsesin Isaac in Nigeria. He writes:

"I am an orphan and I am now 15 years old and I am living with my grandfather and one day I and one of my friends went to church so I enjoyed what I heard there at church. I also heard about born again which is in the book of John 3:3. So one problem I have is that I have no Bible. I just borrowed from my friend on which I read about born again. So if you will help me, that is if you can give some out of those your Bible, I will be very grateful and will be giving you prayer every day."

Another man from Nigeria requests Bibles and says:

"The people are zealous for God, but their zeal is not based on knowledge because they do not have Bibles and they can't afford to buy one because of the high price, for the government of this country charges higher import duty on Christian religious materials and Satan is now using this opportunity to gain ground. But praise be to God that opens the way for us to know you. We know God had solved our problem because if these people can now read and meditate on the Word of God. their life would change for the better."

SILVER LINING

After turning to the Lord in repentance, Samuel H. Froehlich was confronted with which route to take pertaining to church fellowship.

Having been a part of the Swiss protestant state church where he had been baptized as an infant, he continued in his seminary studies with that organization. It is likely he was not certain what to do. As he grew in grace, and in spiritual maturity, however, he was insistent to do God's will and to follow closely what the Bible taught.

Because of economic reasons, he had to return to his home in Brugg for a span of time. He writes: "Here in my father's house began now a new school or period of my life in which I was to be further trained, developed, strengthened, invigorated and grounded, so that I should not enter as a novice into the important office which preaches atonement."

In time, he had occasion---as a student---to serve as a substitute pastor at the state church in Leutweil. His preaching was with great power---and a great awakening took place in this congregation of 1,800 people. He preached the need for conversion as taught in God's Word.

From his evangelical preaching and his studious loyalty to the Bible (instead of to the state church confessions), Froehlich began to draw suspicion from state officials, and from area pastors. Accusations against him became severe and it was a time of terrible storm for him. But he attested, "God stood mightily by me."

When the power of the Gospel, as preached by the young Samuel Froehlich, began to affect hundreds and hundreds of souls who had previously languished under the state church's rationalistic doctrines, Froehlich's fate was soon sealed by an abrupt dismissal from the state church ministry. The fact that his sermons drew large crowds, and included persons from neighboring communities, was too much for state church authorities, and they acted with swift dispatch. He was denied preaching a farewell sermon, much to his dismay.

This unfair abruptness caused Froehlich much inner agony. It reinforced his lack of confidence in the state church. The focal point of his opposition to this body, aside from it's rationalistic theologies, was infant baptism. His disdain for this practice is threaded throughout most of his writings.

He was disturbed by the baptismal liturgy whereby prior to the baptism of an infant questions would be directed to its "sponsors" (usually parents), who would answer for the infant. Froehlich wrote, "This play with holy things I could no longer carry on, in my conviction." At a loss as to what to do with his life in God's service, Froehlich retired for a time to his father's home in Brugg. In response to a letter from a follower in Schaffhausen he wrote, "I can only say 'Dear Father, thy will be done."

The burden of his disassociation with the state church was made even heavier by the fact that Froehlich's family---his parents and brothers and sisters---opposed his views and disagreed strongly with his inability to find concord with the doctrine and liturgies of the state church. Years later, only his sister, Catherine Froehlich, became a part of the new church he would found.

As a young, single man in his mid-twenties, Samuel Froehlich, zealous in faith with a desire to serve God, found himself without ministerial assignment. His lot was to humbly wait on the Lord. Several exploratory journeys across Switzerland, correspondence with a missionary society in England, and discussions with many professed believers would help him find God's will in the days ahead.

"SONRISE" Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, Shioda, Japan

It was sunrise when the women came to the sepulchre of the Lord Jesus Christ. We read in Mark 16:2, "They came unto the sepulchre at the rising of the sun."

Sunrise is a wonderful time of the day. Where we live, the sun comes over the mountains which are located about 2 miles away. As the seasons change, the sun peeks over the mountain range at different locations. The sun brings sunshine and warmth into our lives. It is not simply a luxury---it is a necessity for life.

Now, as I feel all warm and cozy thinking about the sunrise and all it means to us, I recall another SONRISE; the resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ. There is a close parallel between sunrise and SONRISE, the one physical and the other spiritual.

In I Corinthians 15:17 we read, "And if Christ be not raised, your faith is vain; ye are yet in your sins." Here the Apostle Paul is explaining what the situation would be if there were no Sonrise, "If Christ be not raised." He says that in that case our faith is vain or worthless, which is true so far as being redeemed is concerned. He says as much by adding, "Ye are yet in your sins." However, there is another side to this life of faith in Christ, which I would like to explore with you.

The life of a true believer entails a great deal of self-denial for the carnal part of us. Is that good or bad for us? We might say that it is good for living a holy life but bad for having a good time. However, the proposition which I submit is that the life of self-denial regarding worldliness is the best life in every way, here and now, and not just in order to get to Heaven. In that sense, the kind of life taught in the New Testament for believers would still be the way to go, even "if Christ be not raised."


